One was Lester Burleson, 16, of Turner, who drowned while swimming in the Santiam River about 15 miles south of Salem. Other drowning victim was Earl Booth, 23 of Tillamook, who drowned in the ocean at Terra Del Mar beach. The other 11 deaths were charged to traffic accidents.

Camp Pioneer is located seven miles southeast of Marion Forks on the shores of Pine Ridge lake in the Willamette National Forest. The 40acre camp will operate for five consecutive weeks closing August 17. Each period begins on Saturday and

ends on the following Sunday. New this year at the camp are archery and rifle ranges. The schedule calls for instruction in all scouting skills, handicraft and full aquatics program including boating, swimming, life saving and canoeing. Over night hiking trips are also scheduled. Each week a repersentative from the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission will lecture on the State's forest and river wildlife.

Approximately 125 Boy Scouts and leaders are expected to participate in the camp program each week. Awards will be presented to outstanding Scouts in each division at
