The ranger station reported that 1.38 inches of rainfall was recorded at the station in a 36-hour period, from Saturday through Monday morning. Ranger Howard Dean said that although the rain eased fire conditions somewhat, certain forested areas in the North Santian canyon will remain closed to the public until about Labor Day. Closures were placed on them early Friday because of the "extreme fire hazard existing in the areas comprised predominantly of old burns and logged off areas."

The areas affected, little of which is termed recreation districts, include areas adjacent to Tumble Creek, Boulder Ridge, White Water Creek, Bugaboo, Straight Creek, Marion Creek, Kinney Creek, and Leone Creek. Dean said that in most of the above mentioned areas logging operations are continuing.

Marion Lake is not affected and the Marion Lake road is open. A portion of Marion Creek is closed. The presence of "red slash," debris from logging operations plus continued dry weather makes these areas especially hazardous, stated Dean.

An entry permit must be obtained by persons wishing to enter on business. No permit is required of residents going to and from their homes. Complete information on these areas may be obtained at the Detroit ranger station from 7 a. m. to 5 p. m. seven days a week.

Camp Pioneer, official camp of the Cascade Area Boy Scout Council, opened its summer season this week with a full camp. Some 160 Scouts from the Salem, Falls City area are in camp this week. An estimated 600 Scouts from 40 troops will attend the five one-week sessions, reports council officials. Next week troops represented will include Albany, Salem, Independence, Aumsville, Lebanon, Woodburn and Aurora.

Registration is closed for the first three weeks of camp, officials said, but space is still available for the fourth week, beginning August 4 to 10, and in the following week.

At the camp located seven miles southeast of Marion Forks on the shores of Pine Ridge lake in the Willamette National Forest, the Scouts will participate in hiking, overnight camping, handicraft, aquatic sports, fishing, and instruction in scouting skills. An added attraction this year is archery and rifle shooting. In addition to the program outlined above, a representative from the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission will lecture on the State's forest and river wildlife each week.
