Driving Without Fear

Lesson No. 4—How to Make a Left Hand Turn.

In making a left hand turn, at least a half a block to a block before we come to our intersection that we are going to turn left, we get into the outside lane, i.e. the one nearest the center and when we get into the center of the intersection and make our turn, we still keep to the outside lane on the street we have turned into. Never swing right across to the outside lane. The reason is simple; if you swing right across when you make the turn, you block all the traffic going the same way as you, while if you turn into the outside lane, you only actually cut off half the traffic, allowing it to pass you on the right; then when the right hand lane is clear behind you, move over into it but not before. Also, in the state of Oregon, it is permissible to come to a complete stop on a red light, and then make a right turn, provided you are not breaking into a line of oncoming traffic. This is good on all one way or two way streets. You may also make a complete stop on a red light and turn left from a two way to a one way, provided you are in the left hand or center lane; and you may come to a complete stop on a one way street and turn left against a red light, onto a one way street, provided you are on the far left lane of the one way street.
