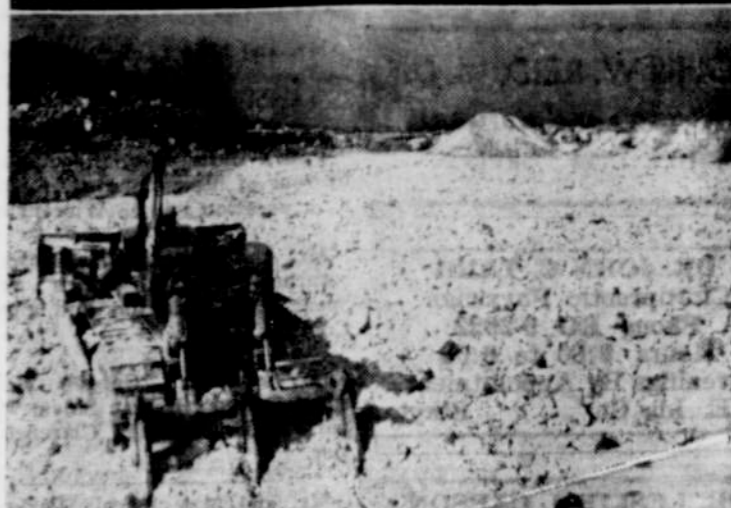

Tree Farmers Have Planted 24,000 Acres Since Year of 1942

"By planting trees on more than 24,000 acres on western Oregon and Washington tree farms this past season," said W. D. Hagenstein, Executive Vice President, Industrial Forestry Association, "tree farmers have planted the equivalent of a strip a mile wide from Tacoma to Eugene since 1942."

The industry forester announced that the Association had shipped 13,389,800 trees from its Col. W. B. Greeley Forest Nursery at Nisqually, Wash., between October 15, 1957 and the end of April. This was the largest crop in the 17-year history of the Nursery, he said.

Coupled with the excellent forest fire prevention record of the last 15 years, the 93 million trees grown by the Nursery have restored more than 170,000 acres of once idle land. In addition to tree planting, he said that the industry had direct-seeded, mostly by helicopter, more than 40,000 acres this past winter.

Hagenstein was quick to point out that in addition to the industry's increasing artificial reforestation efforts, the old mainstay, natural re-seeding, is what has brought nearly 10 million acres back into young trees over the last 50 years.

The forester said that of this year's Greeley Nursery crop, nearly 10 million of the trees were treated with a rabbit repellent. This scares off the "furry-footed monsters" who seem to prefer planted trees to all other plants. Without its use, tree planting is impossible in some areas.

Hagenstein predicted a continuous increase in artificial reforestation as more and more tree farmers place less dependence on natural reforestation.

The forester warned that unwise taxation policies could not only slow down but prohibit reforestation on private land.
