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Philippi Tire Announces Rules For 20 College Scholarships In Safety Contest

A major U. S. tire manufacturer has turned to the youth of America in seeking suggested solutions to the appalling deaths and injuries from highway accidents. Twenty college scholarships will be awarded to 20 boys or girls who give the best answers to what can be done to assure greater highway safety in the U. S. It was announced here today by J. Glenn Julian, Philippi Tire Service, Mehama.

A first prize scholarship of \$1,000 to the college of the winner's choice will be awarded for the best answer, \$900 for the second best, and \$850 for the third best.

Fourth to fourteenth prizes range from \$800 to \$300 scholarships in a descending scale of \$50 less for each prize. The remaining six prizes amount to \$200 each.

Rules of the contest, said Julian, specify that each candidate write in 250 words or less what he thinks could be done to assure greater highway safety.

"The subject is wide open," said Julian. "A contestant is free to cover any area—the duties of the individual, community or government—or to elaborate on any idea that will help cut down highway or traffic city

accidents. Answers will be judged on originality and practicality."

Any boy or girl attending high school or an accredited college anywhere in the United States, except children or employees of The General Tire & Rubber Company, its dealers or agencies, is eligible to enter the contest.

Entries will be accepted from August 15, 1958 to December 1, 1958. Entries postmarked after December 1 will not be accepted. Winners will be notified by mail on or before January 1, 1959.

Judges for the contest will be Ivan L. Eland of the National Safety Council; Joseph Intore, President of the American Driver and Safety Education Association, Penn State University; and Charles A. Mooney, President, Cleveland School Board.

Decision of the Judges will be final and all replies become the property of The General Tire & Rubber Company. No one will be declared a winner without the approval of his school faculty.

The college scholarship contest is part of The General Tire Safer Driving Campaign started last May to attract attention to the need for great-

er care on the part of drivers on U. S. streets and highways.

General Tire dealers across the country are spreading the safer Driving Campaign in their local communities, said Julian. He said entry blanks could be obtained from him without obligation although an official entry blank is not necessary.

In line with this phase of the campaign, Julian is currently distributing Issue No. 2 in its series of "Wake Up and Live" pamphlets.

The pamphlet points out that 11,273 of the 19,848 high schools in the nation offer some type of driver-education course to a student body of 1,123,146 out of a possible 1,706,500 total number of students eligible to drive.

These youngsters will dominate the highways in a few years. It is our goal to instill into them a knowledge of skillful driving combined with an increased awareness for the need of far greater care behind the wheel.

Parachutists Take Prominent Part In Stopping Forest Fires

A second call for parachutists was sent out by the Deschutes forest Monday as heavy smoke rolled up from an area about five miles north of Miller Lake in the southern part of the forest. The other aerial headquarters in the Pacific Northwest Region is at Intercity airport on the Okanogan National Forest near Twisp in eastern Washington.

Inside the national forests the "no smoking while traveling" and "axe-shovel-and-bucket" requirements are in effect. The "no smoking" rule calls for "no smoking while traveling except on paved or surfaced highways". The other rule concerns the necessity of having an axe, shovel and bucket when camping outside of the improved national forest camps, if traveling by auto or with pack horses.

Spaulding said, "With few exceptions, forest areas have become very dry and forest users are cautioned to use extreme care while in the forests." The two above rules should be carefully observed. Although campfire permits are no longer required in the national forests in Oregon and Washington (except they are required on the Yaocit Burn in Gifford Pinchot National Forest) it is just as important as ever that very campfire be thoroughly extinguished before leaving it. Fires should be kept small and built only in places cleared to mineral soil and never against trees, logs or stumps or where roots could carry the fire underground to other flammable material.
