The church was beautifully decorated with baskets of white gladioli and chrysanthemums, with blue streamers and blue foliage, also blue candles.

Soloist for the double ring ceremony was a Mr. Potter of Salem, who sang "Because" and "The Lord's Prayer."

The bride, who was given in marriage by her father, wore a gown of chantilly lace over tulle. The floor-length contoured skirt with tiers of lace and tulle in back was topped by a princess-style bodice of lace design, fashioned with a Sabrina neckline and long pointed sleeves.
