## OCE Coach Talks at Football Banquet Here

The Mill City Lions club treated the league-winning Santiam Football squad at a banquet at Friendship hall Monday night.

President of the club, Rex Ohmart was master of ceremonies, and following the dinner Burton Boroughs, head coach, introduced Gleason Eakin, who in turn introduced the players. He told something of interest about each individual. Twelve seniors are on this year's squad.

On the entertainment program were Bob Harris of the Santiam faculty, who did a humorous musical selection, tying song names with some of the football players. He was followed by Bob Schwartz of the Statesman staff in Salem, who sang several numbers. He was accompanied by Wayne Meusey, a blind pianist, who also played two piano solos.

Main speaker of the evening was Bill McArthur, football coach at Oregon College of Education. In his talk Mr. McArthur praised Gleason Eakin for his work with the football team here, and also told of some of his efforts on the OCE football team before he graduated.

McArthur stated: "good study habits in high school are always reflected in college grades. The scholastic requirements for college entrance are becoming stiffer. It now takes a C average to be able to gain admittance to a college. In this way, the marginal students are weeded out to make more room for students who really intend to make something of their lives. Santiam has a good team and one you all may be proud of. They have played their games well and clean."

He also said praise should be given the "hamburger" squad for their part in helping the varsity train. Without their determination it would be impossible to develop football teams. He said "it takes a lot of courage for freshmen and sophomores to buck up against the juniors and seniors in football practice."

Larry Kanoff, on behalf of the squad, thanked the Lions for the banquet, also thanked the Presbyterian Women's association for their work in preparing the dinner and the yell leaders for serving the banquet.

## Santiam Valley Grange Plans Christmas Party

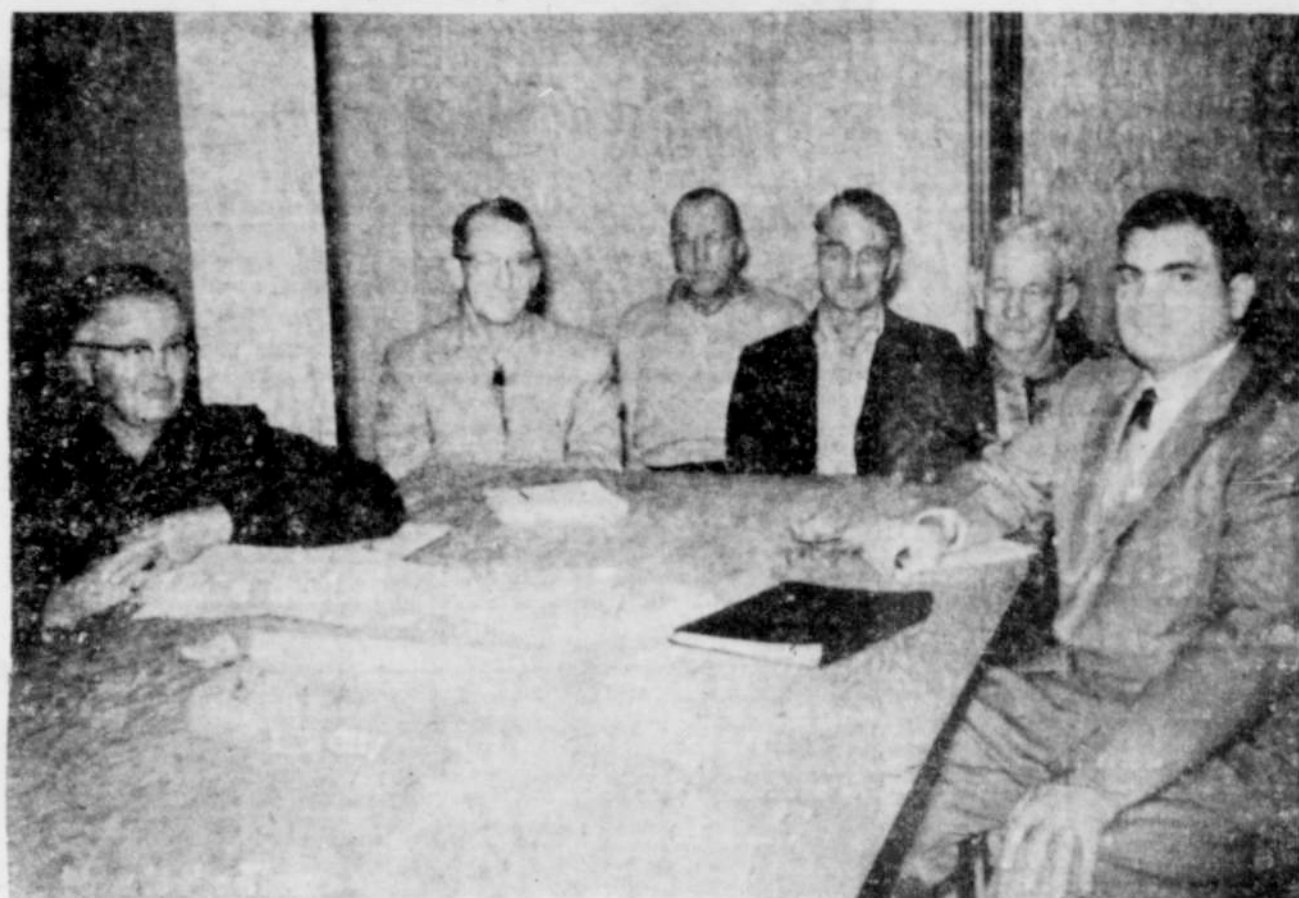

The district and the Volunteer Firemen are also busy installing a pumping unit on truck No. 2, which will cost an estimated \$750 when completed. The Volunteer Department has just purchased 150 feet of 1½ inch fire hose, which cost them \$190.50.

The purchasing of the hose and the suction pump are some of the steps necessary to secure an insurance rate reduction for the community from the Oregon Insurance rating board.

## New Lumber Firm To Build Automatic Sawmill Here on Site Purchased from Vancouver Ply

A new firm, composed of Andy Black and Francis K. Stock of Sweet Home and Nat A. Wills of Mill City have purchased the 130-acre tract and the big mill pond from Vancouver Ply and plan to begin erection of a sawmill after the first of the year. The new firm will operate under the name of Automatic Sawmills. Mr. Black is president; Mr. Wills, vice president and Mr. Stock, secretary.

Mr. Wills on Tuesday stated the modern mill will operate a six foot band saw. Work will be started in the near future clearing the grounds,

in preparation for mill construction. It is the plan of the new firm to build a planing mill also.

When asked how many men would be employed, Mr. Wills said it would be hard to say now, but that the type of mills in operation nowadays do not employ as many men as the old-type operation.

This will settle for once and for all rumors about the sale of this valuable mill site. For the past many years there have been rumors from time to time that the property had been sold, but each time the rumors have dwindled into thin air when efforts were made to run them down.

Mill City welcomes this new firm as it will contribute much to the stability of the area.

## More Changes Listed In Social Security Law

"The Social Security Amendments of 1958 modified the work requirements for both cash disability benefits and the disability freeze," Ben Nichols, Field Representative of the Salem social security office said today. He pointed out this modification will make it easier now for people, whose disabilities have a gradual onset, to qualify.

Under the new law, a worker is no longer required to have 1½ years of coverage out of the three years immediately preceding the onset of his disability. A person can now qualify for either the disability freeze or cash disability payments starting at age 50, if he worked five years out of the 10-year period preceding the onset of his disability and is fully insured. Nichols further explained that if a person has the required five years of coverage he will be fully insured through June, 1961, at least.

The change in the work requirements is effective with applications filed on or after August 28, 1958. Nichols emphasized that anyone whose application for disability payments or disability freeze was turned down because of not having 1½ years of coverage out of the last three years before onset of disability should contact the social security office located at 643 Union Street NE, Salem Oregon, for the purpose of filing an application under the new law.

Nichols concluded by stating the new law did not change the definition of disability. In other words, if a claim was disallowed because it was determined the person was not disabled to the extent required by law, then the recent amendments would have no effect.
