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Spicy Coconut Molasses Muffins

| 2 cups sifted flour | 1/4 cup soft shortening |
| 3 teaspoons double-acting baking powder | 1 egg |
| 3 tablespoons sugar | 1/2 cup unsulphured molasses |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | 1/4 cup milk |
| 1/2 teaspoon ginger | 1 cup Angel Flake Coconut |

Measure sifted flour, add baking powder, sugar, salt, and ginger, and sift together. Cut in shortening with pastry blender or fork until shortening is the size of large peas. Add egg, molasses, milk, and coconut; stir with a fork until all flour is moistened and ingredients are just mixed. (Batter will be slightly lumpy.) Spoon into greased muffin pans, filling only two-thirds full. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 15 to 20 minutes. Run spatula around edges of muffins, turn out, and serve hot. Makes 10 medium-sized muffins.

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
