Snow Pack Only 29 Percent

The 1959 Water supply outlook for the spring and summer months in the Willamette Valley is only fair with late season shortages certain, according to a report released today by W. T. Frost, Snow Survey Supervisor for U. S. Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service and Oregon Agricultural Experiment Station. An extremely short snow-pack coupled with limited irrigation reservoir facilities will produce a relatively mediocre water season.

Water content of the mountain snow-pack is only 29 percent of normal. A normal winter's snow-cover is usually 62 percent (two-thirds) on the ground by February 1st. This year cent of a normal winter's
