Snow Pack Only 29 Percent Of Normal

The 1959 Water supply outlook for the spring and summer months in the Willamette Valley is only fair with late season shortages certain, according to a report released today by W. T. Frost, Snow Survey Supervisor for U. S. Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service and Oregon Agricultural Experiment Station. An extremely short snow-pack coupled with limited irrigation reservoir facilities will produce a relatively mediocre water season.

Water content of the mountain snow-pack is only 29 percent of normal. A normal winter's snow-cover is usually 62 percent (two-thirds) on the ground by February 1st. This year the snow accumulation is only 19 percent of a normal winter's "snow crop".

Winter storms have come as rains rather than snow this year due to unusually warm temperatures. Snow is needed to produce extended summer streamflow.

Soil-mantle in the mountain watersheds is satisfactorily wet. Multiple-purpose reservoirs are close to their normal levels for this time of year.

Forecasts for spring and summer season streamflow in the Willamette Valley are all below normal and range from 83 percent of normal on the Clackamas down to 66 percent of normal on the South Santiam.

Flow of the Willamette at Salem is forecast at 80 percent of normal. The above forecasts assume normal meteorological conditions will prevail during the balance of the year.

State-wide, Oregon's water supply outlook for the spring and summer months of 1959 is extremely poor except where adequate reservoir facilities are operation. The mountain snow-pack is extremely short of water even at high elevations. Reservoir water supplies continue to gain from heavy mid-winter runoff and are well above normal. Summer streamflow is expected to range from 25 to 103 percent of normal.

The next report on snow surveys and water supply forecasts will be issued on March 8, 1959.

Centennial Event To Bring Dignitaries To State Saturday

Angus Bowmer of Ashland, coordinator of the Capitol Centennial ceremonies Saturday, February 14, announces plans have been completed for the impressive event. Vice-President Richard M. Nixon, governors from other states and many foreign diplomatic dignitaries will participate in the parade through downtown Salem shortly after 3 p. m. The 4 p. m. program in the capitol rotunda will receive TV and radio coverage and a public address system will carry the proceedings to areas inside and outside the capitol.

Music will be furnished by the Portland Symphony orchestra and the Portland Symphonic choir. Vice-President Nixon and Governor Mark Hatfield are both scheduled to speak and an appropriate oration will be given by Lincoln Stuart Ferris of Portland. Gloria Krieger, former Rose Festival Queen, now under movie contract in Hollywood, will make an appearance.

The legislative assembly as well as out-of-state dignitaries will witness the ceremony.

A "Prayer Breakfast" will open the Centennial observance in Salem Saturday morning, Feb. 14. The affair will be held in the Capitol Room at the Senator Hotel, starting at 7:30 a. m. with Rev. George H. Swift, chairman of the Religion committee of the Marion County Centennial Association committee, and Otto Skopli, Jr., in charge of arrangements.

Governor Mark Hatfield will give the spiritual message and Supreme Court Justice Hall Lusk will read the Lord's Prayer. Special music is being arranged.

Old Trees Being Cut Near Depot Barber Shop

A few old trees right next to the Depot Barber shop will not be here Saturday to celebrate Oregon's 100th birthday, because this week George Thomas and George Stewart cut them down. Dick Turpin, owner of the trees said Monday he thought the trees must be about 100 years old. It is a shame to cut them down, he said, but a hard wind might blow them over onto some of the buildings in the area.

So instead of being here to enjoy the birthday anniversary of the State they will be used for firewood.

Santiam High Radio Station Aids Searchers

The search for the Miller brothers who are down in a plane between Prineville and Salem centered around Mill City and Gates Tuesday, but nothing could be seen. The area was covered thoroughly, but deep snow and the fact that the plane was while made it next to impossible to spot a down craft in the mountainous area north of here.

Bob Veness, civil defense director for the area, along with Bob Harris of the school faculty and students of the radio club put in many hours giving aid to the search planes.

K7GLQ, the Santiam High School Radio club was asked to join the search for the missing plane on last Saturday's Oregon Emergency Net and on Sunday morning at 6:30 the station was opened by Bob Harris, Santiam Union Hi instructor, for the purpose of giving weather reports to the Lebanon and Salem airports. The station was kept open until 2:00 p. m. when the search was called off for the day. Operators on duty were Bob Veness, Sandra Harris, Helen Harris and Mr. Harris, plus club member David Ried.

On Monday the station was opened at 7:30 a. m. and kept open until 9:40 a. m. when the search was again postponed. One Tuesday, the station opened at 7:30 a. m. with the weather reports and stayed on duty until 1:00 p. m. when the main station was moved to the Detroit school for the purpose of establishing air-ground contact from that point. Helping in the move was David Ried, Don Warde and other club members. The station went on the air as K7CJJ (Bob Harris's call) at 2:30 and left the air at 4:30 p. m. W7TWF and W7UIU from Salem in the meantime brought up additional equipment from Salem to fill in the school station. Sandra Harris, club president, stayed on duty at the school station. Operators of the school station have been highly commended for their work by the State Aero Board as well as other operators from the entire western part of Washington. When questioned about this activity, Mr. Harris pointed out that a part of the Radio Club constitution made the operation of emergency equipment a necessary part of the club's function. "We are proud to be able to serve the area in this way" said Mr. Harris.

Oregon Centennial Officials Hunt For Photos of Covered Wagons On Way To Oregon in 1850-60

Officials of the Oregon Centennial issued an urgent nation-wide call today, asking for photographs of covered wagon trains on their way to Oregon between 1850 and 1850.

The advisory committee on history said authentic photographs are needed for the historical phase of Oregon's celebration of 100 years of statehood. The state was admitted to the union February 14, 1859, but the celebration will continue through the summer and be highlighted by an exposition and international trade fair at Portland June 10 through September 17.

The committee said many pictures of covered wagon trains were taken in the 1850s, and at least three photographers made extensive collections of Daguerrotypes on the plains and in the mountains.

It listed these photographers as: J. Wesley Jones, who took 1,500 pictures on the plains and in the mountains in the summer of 1851. All are missing.

J. M. Stanley, an artist as well as a Daguerrotypist, who moved to the far west with the party of Gov. Isaac I. Stevens of the Washington territory. The committee said there is

evidence that Stanley took a number of Daguerrotypes on the plains, but none has been found.

S. N. Carvalho, a Daguerrotypist from Baltimore, who went to California in the party of Col. John C. Fremont, leaving Missouri in September, 1843, and crossing the mountains in mid-winter. Carvalho took "a large number" of photographs, though the committee said the exact number is not known. All the originals are missing, but the committee expressed belief that if they cannot be located, at least copies made in 1856 can be found.

The Daguerrotype process required that the subjects remain in a fixed position for a considerable period of time so that genuine pictures of the period will lack action. The photograph herewith was taken from a drawing made from memory by a pioneer at some date subsequent to 1870.

The committee asked that anybody who has information concerning Wagon train Daguerrotypes or photographs immediately write the Oregon Centennial Commission, 400 Jackson Tower, Portland, Oregon.
