What Grass or Grasses Best for Lawns?

What grass or grasses are best for lawns? This question confronts every one who seeds a new lawn.

To help answer this question, eight different varieties of grass and three lawn mixtures were seeded in plots in Bush Park last fall. The plots are along the entrance to Bush House in the park across from the rose gardens. They are for the observation of anyone who may be interested.

Astoria and Highland bentgrass, Chewings Fescue, several varieties of creeping red fescue, and the Merion strain and common Kentucky bluegrass were seeded in the plots. These varieties of grass are most commonly recommended and used in mixtures in the Willamette Valley.

The plots were seeded by the Marion County Extension Office in cooperation with the Salem Parks Department. Further information on the plots may be obtained at either of their offices.
