Teachers are to report to their classrooms August 31, in order to prepare for their work in advance. Faculty meetings will be held Tuesday, September 2 Thursday, September 3, school will be dismissed in order that teachers may attend the county inservice meeting at Stayton, and school will resume on a limited schedule Friday. No school on Labor Day, and the first full day of classes will be September 8. The school lunch room will not be in operation until that day.
