The United War Chest Drive was underway in Mill City and progressing well under the chairmanship of Mrs. Ed Rupp. Solicitors included Betty Meiner, Bertha Baltimore, Virginia Kelly, Gladys Lake, Alice Howe, Alberta Smith, Altha Grimes and Marion Todd.

An article on the front page of The Enterprise discussed the shortage of merchandise in the stores. Particularly short were mens shoes, radios and other appliances. Also practically non-existent was any type of floor covering. So different today with all the eye-catching merchandise; the only shortage being money in some instances. With the easy payment plan—even that is not much of a deterrent.

The Mill City Manufacturing company was observing its 9th anniversary—an editorial from the Capital Journal of April 24, 1937, "A town that refused to die" was rerun.
