Funeral Services Held For John Neal

LYONS — Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon, January 16 at Weddle Funeral Home in Stayton for John Neal of Lyons, who passed away last Monday evening January 11 at Santiam Memorial hospital following a heart attack. He was 68 years old. Rev. Ruth Cotton of the Lyons Methodist church officiated.

John Nelson Neal was born April 4, 1891 near Jordan, and was the youngest son of Daniel F. and Elizabeth Neal, pioneers of that area.

John, as he was known to his many friends, lived his entire life in this area. He was a blacksmith and tanner.

On June 24, 1914 he was married to Laura Westenhove. Two daughters preceded him in death, Adora born March 17, 1920 passed away January 28, 1928; Elva Elizabeth born February 6th, 1923, passed away February 8th, 1933.

He leaves to mourn his passing, his widow, Laura, one sister, Martha Pepperling of Scio, one brother, Tom Neal of Hawthorne, Nev., Eleven nephews, and nine nieces.

Interment was at Bilyeu Den cemetery near Jordan. Pallbearers were Raymond Holz-fuss, Mike Schwindt, Fred Lindemann, Frank Sherwood, Cecil Grimes and Fred Rohwein.
