Training Program Made Available By U. S. Navy

Chief Hessman, recruiter in charge of the Salem Navy Recruiting Station announced today that the Navy has just made available an extensive training program in the New Polaris Field. Young men who are able to qualify for enlistment in the Polaris Field category of the Navy's high school graduate training program will receive highly specialized training as Polaris launchers or in Polaris electronics. Chief Hessman stated. The Polaris Missile has been developed by the Navy for use aboard the fleet Ballistic Missile Nuclear Powered Submarines. The Polaris field is an entirely new program and opportunities for travel, education, and advancement are virtually unlimited. Along with the establishment of the Polaris Field, the Navy has divided the Nuclear Field program into two separate categories: Nuclear Electronics, and Nuclear Mechanical-Electrical, to permit well qualified trainees to receive more highly specialized training in the field of their choice. In addition to these highly technical fields, there are nearly fifty other choices of training within the Navy high school graduate training program. Chief Hessman reported.
