legs, influence of the French chef.

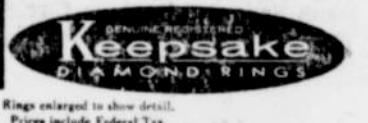
It's a long way from the North Fork to Virginia but it's fun to travel in fancy sometimes—and much cheaper, too.

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
