Board of Health Urges Tetanus Shots Now

The Oregon State Board of Health said today that many Oregon residents are not adequately protected against tetanus. "Unless people have received an initial immunization series, a booster shot every five years and following injury, they should see their physician and get their shots up to date," Carl Holm, president of the Oregon State Board of Health, said.

"Tetanus, popularly known as lockjaw, is an acute irritation of the nervous system. The germs multiply at the site of a wound through which they enter the body. Toxin or poison is produced and carried to the central nervous system by the bloodstream. Painful contractions of the neck and jaw muscles often follow," explained Dr. Holm.

Best Way to Handle Deer Meat in Field Listed for Hunters

Fresh flavorful venison for the table starts with cool careful treatment in the field. With the opening of hunting season, Andrew Landforce, extension wildlife specialist at Oregon State University, suggests correct procedure for caring for the meat.

1) Clean animal as soon as possible and cool deer meat quickly—the faster the better. It's ideal, says Landforce, when the deer can be field dressed and hustled to nearby camp, home or a cold storage locker to be skinned. But for the many hunters who do not find themselves in such convenient surroundings Landforce continues his instructions.

2) After cleaning the animal either skin it on the spot or move it back to camp and skin it—if the camp isn't too far away. If the dressed deer has to be dragged back to camp or the car, lace the carcass together with a heavy leather shoelace before dragging it over the ground. This helps keep sticks, weeds and dirt away from the meat. To skin, hang it in a tree, split carcass in half leaving the last neck vertebrae connected to help balance the halves while hanging. If no tree is available, remove the hide while the deer is on the ground.

Preferably let hang until meat is no longer sticky. Wipe with a dry cloth. This hastens formation of a glaze which helps prevent spoilage and keeps the meat clean. Wrap the meat if it's sunny and unwrap at night to cool.

3) After skin is off, quarter the carcass and put pieces into individual meat sacks. Pack back to camp and hang up at once. Hunters who aren't able to move meat back to camp right away can hang the entire carcass in a tree or upon poles or rocks on the ground. This permits air to circulate around the meat and speed up the cooling process.

Meat sacks help keep flies and dirt away from the meat. If sacks are not available placing pine boughs over the meat helps keep it cool and clean.

"Chances are people who say they don't like venison probably have eaten meat that wasn't properly cared for," says the specialist. Last year more than 157,000 deer were killed in Oregon by 350,000 hunters.

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
