June License Renewals Due Soon

If your car license expires at the end of June, you'll be receiving a renewal reminder notice in the mail within the next few days. Don't lose the notice.

That's the advice of the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles. Use of the form in renewing license plates will mean prompter service to car owners and help cut costs and processing time for the department.

If your plates expire in June and you do not receive a renewal notice, this means the address on file with the department is incorrect, and steps should be taken to up-date the address on your registration card.

The notice received in the mail should be used whether the renewal is mailed to Salem or taken to a local field office.



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New Substations Now in Operation For P P & L

One of Oregon's largest electric power substations, a \$1,500,000 installation that forms the crossroad for Pacific Power & Light Company's transmission lines serving the Willamette valley, is now operating to supply more power needed by PP&L customers in western Oregon.

More than a quarter of a million homes and farms could be supplied with the large amount of electricity that this facility can handle at any one time," according to Tom Keenan, the company's Linn county district manager.

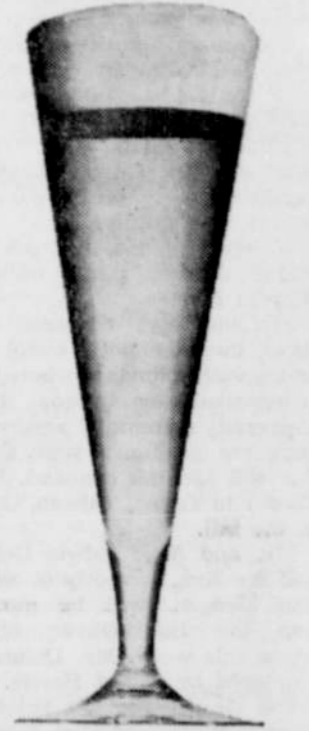
Located southeast of Albany, the facility is the hub for 230,000 and 115,000 volt transmission lines radiating to other substations at neighboring cities and rural areas from which other lines carry the power to homes, farms, stores and industries throughout the valley area.

Officials of the company are scheduled to formally dedicate the installation to the service of the company's customers at a ceremony Monday at the installation. Mayors of Linn county cities and county commissioners were to join the group at a power switching demonstration.

Currently under construction southward is a new line of 230,000 volt capacity that will provide an interconnection between the company's hydroelectric projects on southern Oregon with those of the northern part of its system. Together, the powerhouses will form a power generating system with more than 1,000,000 kilowatts of power output.
