## Last Rites Held For May Quier

LYONS—May Quier, a Lyons resident, who passed away on October 31 at Stayton, was one of the few if not the only woman to homestead in Oregon in the early 1900's and prove up on her claim.

After teaching school in Yellow Pine, Ala., she came west in 1910, and was the first school teacher at old Fort Harney, (later the county seat of Harney county, and now a ghost town.)

From there she moved to Virginia Valley and home-

stead 320 acres. She married Harley Quier in 1914 and continued to live on the homestead where five children were born. In 1931 the family moved to Buxton, where Mrs. Quier was postmaster for 13 years.

Retiring at the age of 70, she moved to Eugene where she enrolled in the University of Oregon.

Following a short illness she moved to Lyons where she resided the past two years. She leaves five children: Del Quier, Brookings; Ed Quier, Burnt Ranch, Calif.; Mrs. Frances Reinoehl, Santa Barbara, Cal.; Mrs. Esther Simpson, Baker; Mrs. Jean Roberts, Mehama and a sister, Mrs. Fannie Howard of Portland.
