The Gates Woman's club had netted \$200 from their fall bazaar in spite of a heavy rain and a power outage that night. The show went on by lantern light until 9:30.

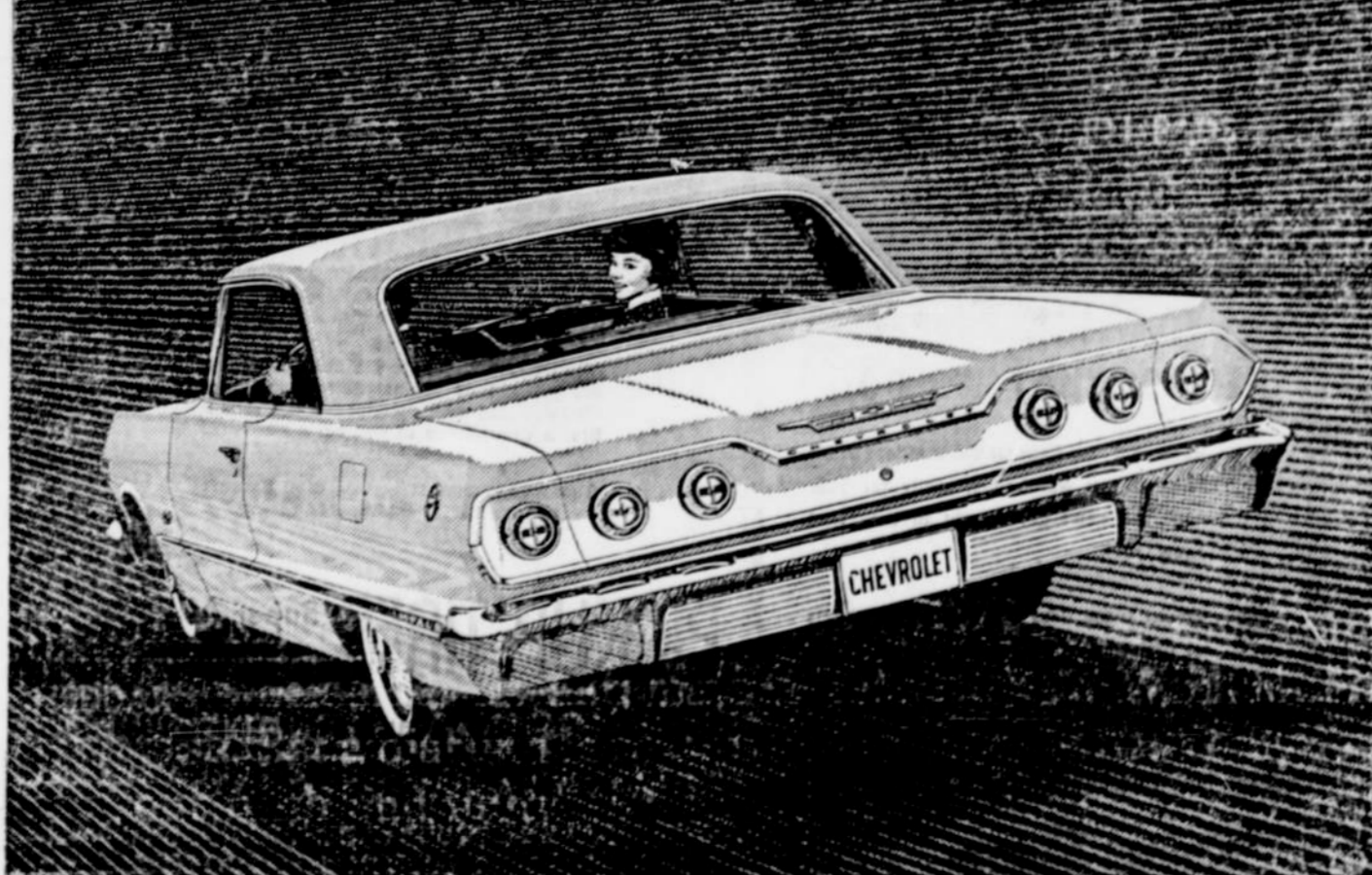
