Mehama Girl Tells About Army Life in France

The following was sent to The Enterprise by SP4 Gerry L. Butts (Gerry Roberts) formerly of Mehama, who is stationed in France.

"The town we are in is Orleans, the 'City of Joan of Arc.' Joanie saved the city of Orleans from the British, way back. The have a huge statue of her in armor on a huge horse right in the middle of town. Every May they have a festival here honoring St. Joan.

"Last month we went to Paris and toured the Louvre. It is fabulous. Saw Venus de Mille and the Mona Lisa (just before they shipped it to New York.) The painting lacked much in my opinion, but the 'Venus' was beautiful. The museum was huge. We plan to make another trip soon as there is too much to see in less than a week. Very inexpensive too, 20c a piece.

"We went to the Champs-Elysees which is the biggest street in Paris, about four lanes each way plus an extra on each side. The Arch of Triumph is right in the middle. We walked under it and it's huge. I didn't know it was so big until I got under it. Their unknown soldier is underneath, with several wreaths of flowers and it has a lamp, or torch, run by gas that has never been out but once and that was when the Germans occupied the city. It gives you a funny feeling to know that the lamp has been burning continuously since before you were born."
