Attending from here will be: Mrs. Harry Mason, Mrs. Francis Bodeker and Mrs. Leo Russell.

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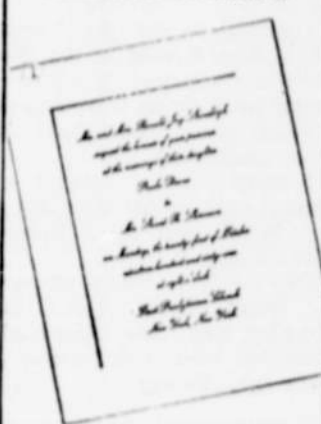
