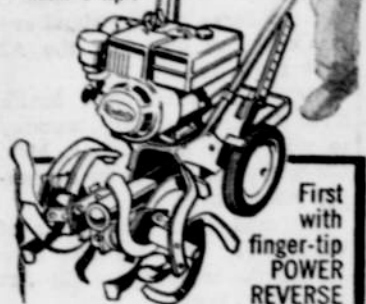
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Mother of Local Man Passes Away

Mrs. Julia Elizabeth DeGuire, 101, died Thursday evening at her home in Silverton. She was the mother of Charles DeGuire of Mill City. She had lived in the Silverton area for the past 71 years, and had been in ill health the past eight years.

The death of Mrs. DeGuire leaves only four persons in the mid-Willamette Valley who are 100 or older.

She was born in England, February 18, 1862 and came to Canada when she was 7. She moved to Silverton about 1892. She was the widow of Charles Frank DeGuire, who died in 1929. He was a Civil War Veteran, farmer, grocer, jeweler, band leader and founder of the People's Bank at Silverton.

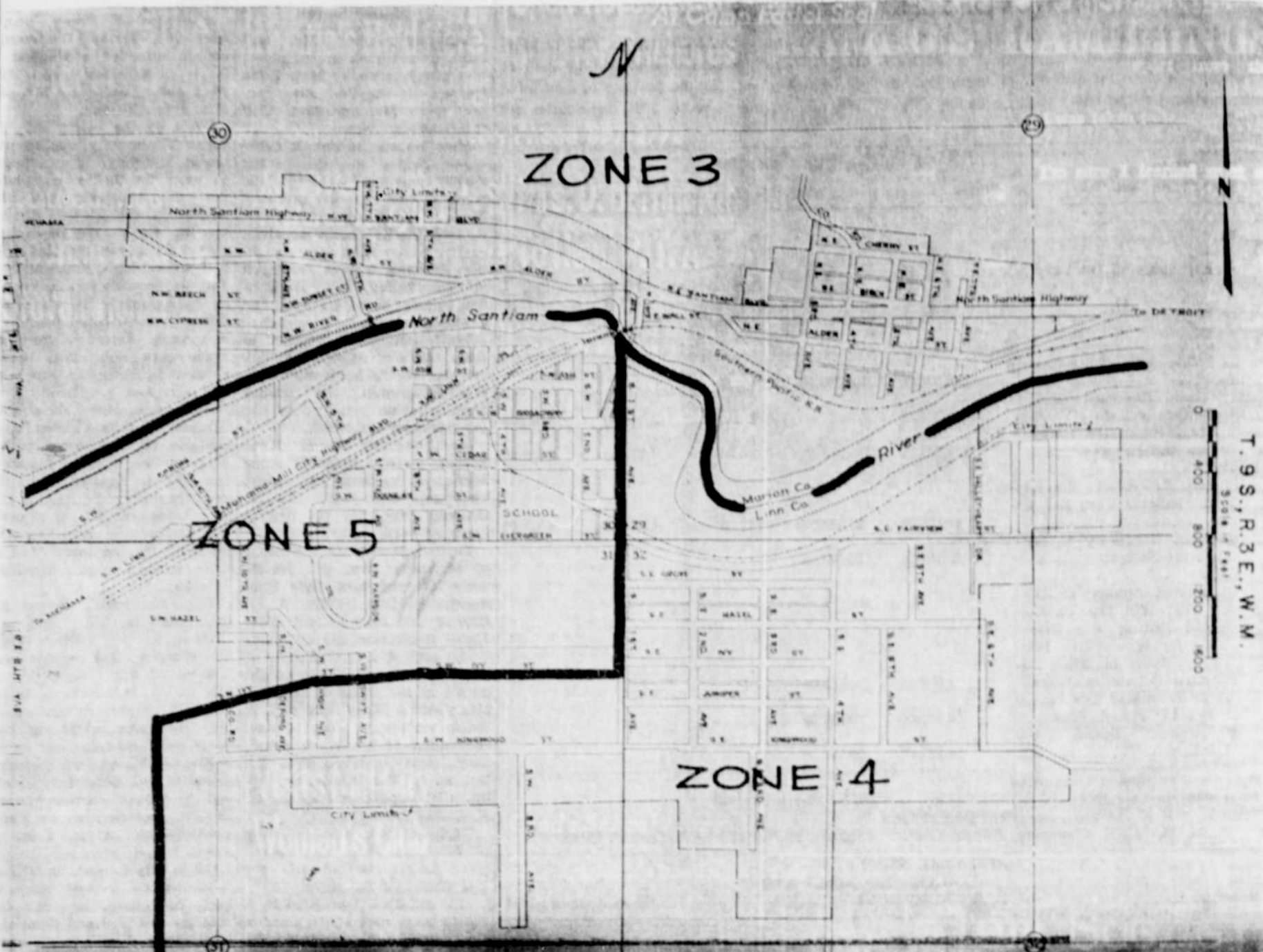

LEGAL NOTICE
In accordance with O. R. S. 330.700, voters of the Administrative District, 129J, comprising the Mill City Elementary, Gates Elementary, and Santiam Union High School areas are hereby notified that on April 1, 1963, there will be elected, for the newly reorganized district, 5 directors.

- 1 to serve for five years
- 1 to serve for four years
- 1 to serve for three years
- 1 to serve for two years
- 1 to serve for one year

Election will take place in each of the elementary schools of the above area from 2:00 to 8:00 p. m., on April 1, 1963.

For the school board of the Administrative District, each member must come from a different zone. Length of term of office will be determined by a total number of votes cast for different candidates. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes in each zone will be elected for that zone.

Zone 1—is that area of the present Gates Grade School

District lying North of the North Santiam River.

Zone 2—is that part of the present Gates Grade School District lying South of the North Santiam River.

Zone 3—is that part of the present Mill City Elementary School District lying North of the North Santiam River.

Zone 4—is that part of the present Mill City School District lying South of the North Santiam River, and

East of a line starting at the river, going South down the center of First Street to its intersection with Ivy Street, westerly down the center of Ivy Street to the West line of the East half of Section 31 in Township 9 S, Range 3 E, continuing south along this half-section line to the school district boundary.

Zone 5—is that part of the present Mill City School District lying South of the

North Santiam River, and West of the line described in Zone 4.

Voting will be at large, but Board members must reside in the designated zones.

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When you are ready to build, the law can help in many ways to make your home enjoyable and secure.

Have you decided on the type house you want and what to spend? Well then, let's go into details:

1. Your lot: Junior's school may be nearby, so find out:

- (a) Whether they are planning to run a highway through the area or nearby, or make any major improvements for which you can be assessed.
- (b) What "covenants run" with the land? To protect residents, the basic deeds of some neighborhoods, for example, call on you to build a certain type of house. Do you want to, and can you afford to?
- (c) Easements: Either you or your neighbor may need to run pipes, or string wires over each other's land, or to share a driveway. Check all such easements with your county recorder. Or talk to your prospective neighbors if some of these things do not show up in the title search.

2. Zoning ordinances: For your protection your city zones some areas, for example, for

single houses, for multiple dwellings, and retail stores, for manufacturing and the like.

Unless the city changes its zoning law, no factory, for instance, can go up next to you, say, in a residential area. But you should find out what your neighborhood zoning rules are.

3. Financing. Financing contracts protect both you and the lender. Unless you pay cash, you will use credit to buy your house, most likely backed by a deed of trust: a trustee holds title until you pay for your house on time. Your payments may cover principal, interest, insurance, and taxes. Fall behind and the holder can take the house back. You may get some of your money back on the principal, but you may also have to make up any loss the owner makes in re-selling.



Well worked out contracts can help make your dream house come true. You know what you want. You should be careful to do the best you can to obtain it through careful planning and checking the legal details.
