Mr. Walter was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Walter (Wilma Bates) of the Rogers Mountain area. He was born and educated in the Stayton area. He was employed at the Stayton Cannery and also farmed in the Scio area.

Mrs. Walters' mother, Mrs. Margaret Haynes, who is an invalid and also suffers from a heart ailment was taken to the Albany hospital suffering from shock when told of the accident. Mrs. Walter's brother, Larry Haynes, is serving with the U. S. Navy and was at sea when notified of the accident.

Rev. Gerald Manley will officiate at the funeral services and interment will be at the Franklin Butte cemetery.
