Lyons Phone Co. Makes Plans To Incorporate

LYONS—A large group attended a recent meeting of the People's Co-operative Telephone Co. at Mari-Linn school. The meeting was called to discuss changing from a co-operative to a stock company.

Reason for the proposed change is to make a membership in the telephone company of some value moneywise by owning stock in the company. By changing to a stock company the following changes would take place:

1. The company would pay the stockholders dividends on money earned. At present earned money is used to buy new equipment as needed.
 2. To replace old equipment and future expansion, money would have to be borrowed and interest paid, as profits could not be used except for dividends.
 3. If a member moved he could retain his stock and receive dividends or sell the stock for par value. At present when a member moves his membership is non-transferable.
 4. Taxes would remain as is. The only increase taxwise would be income tax. No service will be curtailed in the change and no raise in rate is considered.
- A motion was made and unanimously passed to instruct the board of directors to have the Articles of Incorporation for a stock company drawn up. They will then be presented at a public hearing for explanation before voting on any change.

Herschel Clark Takes Part in Maneuvers With Army in Germany

U. S. FORCES, Germany (Ahtnc)—Army PFC Herschel B. Clark, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Verne H. Clark, Route 1, Lyons, Ore., recently participated in the 242d Quartermaster Battalion's Annual Training Test (ATT) in Germany.

The ATT is the toughest and most complete assessment of a unit's combat readiness and provides the most grueling, exacting and realistic conditions possible in peacetime.

Clark, a heavy equipment repairman in the battalion's Company B, entered the Army in January 1961 and was stationed at Fort Lee, Va., before arriving overseas in May 1962. He is a 1958 graduate of Santiam Union High School, Mill City, and was employed by the Stayton Canning Company before entering the Army.

Oregon Completes Short Fire Season

Oregon has just completed the shortest fire season in its history. An amendment recently passed by the state legislature terminated the automatic April 1 closing date for the fire season. All forest regulations subject to the declaration for a closed season will henceforth be put into effect by proclamation of the Governor upon the advice of the State Forester as fire hazard conditions warrant. The season will be similarly terminated.

The amended law also provides that the closed season

may be applied to any part of the state according to existing fire hazard conditions in an official fire district. Subsequent closed seasons in other areas may be applied as fire conditions make it necessary. The state forester has indicated that his recommendation for designation of the closed season will be by advice of the district warden and forest supervisors in the areas concerned.
