High Lakes To Open for Fishing Sat.

Oregon anglers are reminded that on Saturday, May 25, the high lakes in the Cascade and Paulina mountains will open to general trout angling. Also opening on that date will be all streams in the coastal zone from St. Helens on the Columbia to the California border. The season will extend through the summer to October 31.

Popular areas opening up for anglers include productive East and Paulina lakes in the Paulina mountains; Diamond lake in the Umpqua headwaters; South and North Twin lakes; Big Lava, Sparks and Elk lakes, all in the Deschutes basin; Timothy lake at the head of the Clackamas; and Clear lake to the east of Mt. Hood.

All of the lakes in the high mountain lake basins will be open to anglers, but undoubtedly many of these will require a trek over trails still covered with snow. Popular and productive lake basins include the Mountain Lakes Wild Area in the Klamath country; the Rogue headwaters including the Seven lakes basin, the Sky lakes and the Cloud lake group; the Taylor Burn country to the north of Waldo lake; the Mink lake basin with closest access over trails out of Elk lake; the Marion lakes in the Mt. Jefferson area; and the Olallie lake basin between Mt. Jefferson and Mt. Hood.

Anglers are urged to check on road conditions before heading into the back country. The Olallie lake road will undoubtedly be closed until about mid-June or thereabouts, and North Century Drive, and the road into Irish and Taylor lakes are seldom open at this early date.

Ranger Station Issues Report on Area Campgrounds

Weekly recreation report issued by the Mill City Ranger station giving campground conditions, hunting and fishing areas that are now bringing "good luck" to the fishermen and other outdoor tips indicate a good week-end.

Boulder Ridge road is now open all the way. Elk Lake road should be open to Elk Lake. Opal Lake road is open to Cedar Creek unit and then closed by snow. Breitenbush road is open seven miles East of Breitenbush Guard station.

The trail to Leone Lake is in good condition. The Elk Lake campground is closed. The Leone Lake camp area is usable. West Humburg, Breitenbush, Cleator Bend and Shady Cove campgrounds are open.

Good fishing is indicated in the Breitenbush river, Santiam river, Detroit Reservoir and Leone Lake.

Fire danger is becoming increasingly severe. There is heavy logging traffic down the Breitenbush. More hot and dry weather is expected.

Physical Examinations Required for Those Entering First Grade

Prospective first graders who will be attending school here next year will be sent letters within the next few days giving them the date they will be asked to register. Youngsters getting these letters will be those who were on the school census last fall. Those moving to town since that time are asked to contact the grade school office.

All first graders need birth certificates or other proof of birth such as hospital records.

They must be 6 years of age by November 15 and have a physical examination before entering school.

It is also recommended that immunizations should be brought up to date before that time. The next pre-school clinic will be announced at a later date.

Phone Rates Lower Than In Old Days

"Things aren't what they used to be" . . . and it's a good thing they're not.

At least, that's the way a lot of people making long distance telephone calls these days ought to feel.

Lowell E. Brown, Manager of Valley Telephone company is the authority for this opinion and his reasoning is that long distance telephone calls cost only 5% of what they did back in the "Good Old Days."

Long Distance telephone rates have been progressively reduced during a period of general inflation and a continually increasing cost of living. When coast-to-coast service was established in 1915, a call from New York to San Francisco cost \$20.70. Nine successive reductions brought the rate down to \$2.25 in September, 1959. The "After 9" rate put into effect April 4, 1963 established a rate of \$1 plus tax anywhere in the United States between the hours of 9 p. m. and 4:30 a. m.

The new "After 9" rate also brought savings for intrastate calls of over 90 miles. Up to 45 cents can be saved using the new rate period rather than the evening rate for calls within the state.

Savings with the "After 9" rate are progressively greater the further the distance called. Also, the greatest savings are with station-to-station calls. Person-to-person rates are reduced but not in proportion to the more easily handled station or "number" calls.

Next time you are planning to call a city over 100 miles away, a check with the rate operator will show the savings that are yours for the asking.

USS KAWISHIWI—Dennis R. Klutke, seaman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Klutke of Gates, who is serving aboard the fleet oiler USS Kawishwi, took part in the Pacific recovery of Astronaut Leroy Gordon Cooper.

The primary recovery ship was the aircraft carrier USS Kearsarge, which picked up Astronaut Walter Schirra at the conclusion of his six-orbit flight last October. There were 12 other ships taking part in the recovery of Cooper, after his successful flight into space.

The Kawishwi normally operates out of Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. She helped replenish ships of the recovery force during operations.

Young & Morgan High Bidders At Timber Sale

Detroit—The Detroit District Ranger Station of the Willamette National Forest held a timber sale auction Monday, May 13, 1963. The apparent high bidder for the Pup Meadows Timber Sale was Young & Morgan, Inc., of Idanha, Oregon.

The appraised stumpage value was \$165,876. The final oral bidding resulted in a stumpage value of \$281,945. The Douglas-Fir stumpage value increased from an appraised \$17.70 per thousand board feet to \$44.00 per thousand board feet. The total volume of the timber sale is twelve million one hundred thousand board feet.

The legal voters of Administrative District No. 129-J of Linn-Marion counties are reminded that a school meeting of the recently formed new district will be held at Santiam Union High school on the 23rd day of May for the purpose of discussing the budget. Time of the meeting will be 8 p. m.

An election will be held Monday, May 27 from 2 until 8 p. m. at the Gates elementary school and the Mill City elementary school when the proposed budget will be submitted for vote.

The budget committee is composed of the new administrative school board members plus five freeholders.

Board members are Don Walker, chairman; Bill Pennick, vice chairman; Homer Williamson, Martin Hansen and Donald Westrick.

Freeholders are Bob Oliver, chairman; Verne Shaw, secretary; Arthur Hempeck, Josephine Reid and Charlene Cooper.

Tentative budgets were submitted by the present administrators, George Stovall, Larry Brent and Bill Gleason. These budgets were reviewed and coordinated to fit the needs of the new district. Present for the budget session was William Lewellen, recently appointed administrator for the new district.

While budget figures are somewhat higher than last year the tax levy is actually expected to be lower. One reason for this is the fact that more money is expected this year from the Rural School fund than in any previous year.

The budget for the reorganized district is considerably less than it would have been under the three separate districts.
