strengthen our bodies. How-  
ever, it is important that we  
yearn, and nourish our minds.  
It is urgent that we succeed  
in whatever vocations or call-  
ings occupy our lives. However,  
it is important that we succeed  
in the art of life itself.  
It is urgent that we strive to  
take advantage of the new op-  
portunities which are always  
presented to us. However, it is  
important that we pause and  
enjoy the blessings that we al-  
ready have."  
The one paragraph which to  
me is a real truth is the one  
about feeding and clothing our  
children, plus the importance  
of giving them our presence  
and active love. I believe one  
of the main purposes of parents  
now, more than ever before, is  
to give our children the feeling  
of being loved and wanted. The  
feeling that whatever they do,  
they should be able to come  
home and know that they will  
be understood. They should  
know that when they are wrong  
they will be reprimanded with  
a firm hand, but at the same  
time with fairness. I can well  
remember when I was quite  
young that I always had the  
feeling that home was the place  
where I was safe from all harm.  
It was a good feeling. When  
everything seemed to be going  
wrong in the world, I had the  
feeling of security at "home."  
It was a place where nothing  
could touch me, or at least that  
was the feeling of security my  
parents had instilled in me.

that parents do not take the  
time to give their children this

**Lyle Cummings Gets Grant for Month at Oregon State**

Oregon State University—  
Lyle G. Cummings, Mill City,  
has been selected to attend an  
eight-week mathematics in-  
stitute this summer at Oregon  
State University.  
The institute will be support-  
ed by a grant from the National  
Science Foundation. Fifty-six  
junior and senior high school  
teachers will attend.  
Each of the teachers picked  
to participate will receive \$75  
a week, plus tuition and fees  
and some travel and dependent  
allowances. Dr. A. R. Poole,  
professor of mathematics at  
OSU, will be institute director.  
The institutes are part of a  
giant program organized by  
National Science Foundation to  
"improve science and mathe-  
matics teaching, to increase the  
U.S. supply of top-flight sci-  
entists and teachers, and to stim-  
ulate greater interest among  
young people in science."  
Oregon State is one of the  
nation's major centers for the  
teacher training programs.

**10 Safety Rules For Swimmers, Boaters Listed**

An estimated 6550 people will  
drown this year in the United  
States, some 2550 from swim-  
ming or playing in the water  
alone. An additional 4000 will  
fall from docks, bridges, or  
drown within 75 feet of shore.  
Most of the individuals who  
become part of these dismal  
statistics will do so because  
they fail to observe 10 simple  
rules around water, according  
to Edward J. Slezak, associ-  
ate professor in Physical Edu-  
cation and Recreation at Ore-  
gon State University.  
To live longer while enjoy-  
ing water sports, everyone  
should observe the following  
rules, says Slezak.  
1. Learn to swim.  
2. Never swim alone.  
3. Refrain from swimming  
too soon after meals.  
4. Enter the water gradually—  
never turn back to surf waters.  
5. Swim only when life guards  
are on duty.  
6. Never call for help unless  
needed.  
7. Listen to instruction.  
8. Observe all beach and pool  
regulations.  
9. Have a boat and two good  
swimmers escort you on long  
swims.  
10. Never over load boats,  
canoes, and wear life jackets.
