Traffic Toll High This Year In Oregon

Oregon motorists compiled another all-time grisly traffic death record for the month of May. Following closely on the heels of the record death toll for March, two of the first five months of 1963 have now set new records for traffic deaths, according to the Traffic Safety Division of the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles.

Fifty traffic deaths recorded in May topped the previous high for that month set in 1948 when 44 were killed in traffic. The March toll of 56 also set a new record for that month. The five-month traffic death count was 196, compared with 157 for the same period in 1962. The previous five-year average for the first five months of the year was 159.

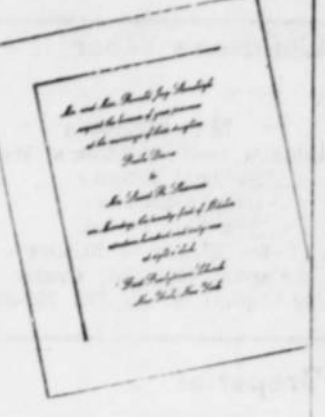
Officials said one of the most disturbing aspects of the five month toll is that it is well ahead of the death toll for the same period in 1959 when the state recorded its all-time high in traffic deaths, 492. At the end of five months that year, 179 traffic deaths had been reported.

State safety officials urged drivers to practice defensive driving during the dangerous driving months ahead and to shield themselves from traffic trouble by obeying all traffic laws.



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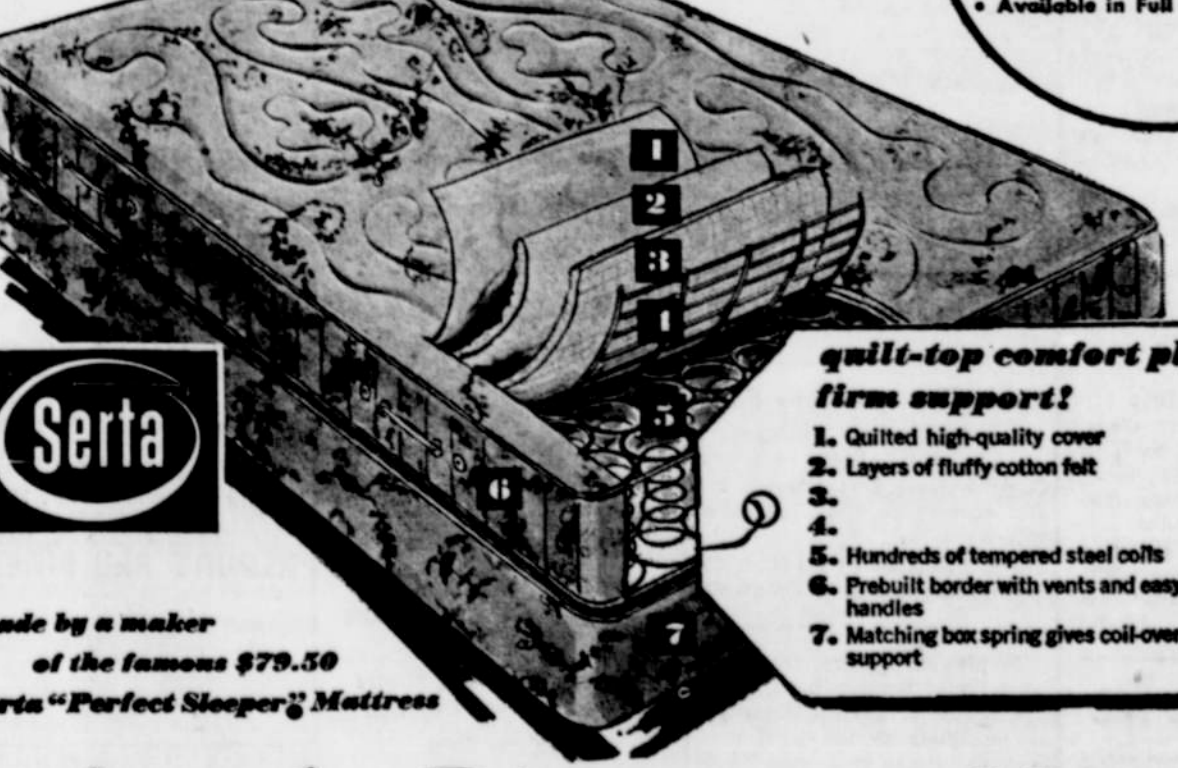
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
