Drapery Making Directions Told In OSU Circular

Summer's a good time to replace faded draperies in children's rooms, or give kitchen windows a spiffy new treatment. "Specials" on drapery fabrics plus a new Oregon State University extension circular can help the most inexperienced seamstress with drapery making.

The new circular "Make Your Own Draperies" helps the shopper select appropriate fabrics, figure yardage required, and construction techniques for both lined and unlined draperies.

Author Evelyn Funk, an OSU state extension agent, includes step-by-step diagrams for the drapery making process including tricky french pleats. Miss Funk was formerly home furnishings specialist at Oklahoma State University.

The last few pages of the circular are devoted to drapery hardware. Miss Funk shows some of the hooks now on the market and suggests how they be used. She also discusses drapery rods and weighting shots used to make corners hang evenly.

Copies of the new publication may be obtained from county extension offices or from the OSU bulletin clerk.

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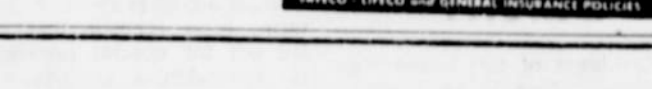
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
