Detroit Dam Continues to Attract Sightseers and Recreationists

Detroit Dam on the North Santiam River, had 28,962 visitors during May, according to Donald A. Westrick, Project Engineer at the U. S. Army Engineers installation. Westrick said there were 12,934 day use visitors to the reservoir area, 5,752 sightseers, 4,659 overnight campers and 3,617 highway viewpoint visitors. Boat fishermen during May numbered 15,172 and bank fishermen 2,050. He said 17 water skiers tried out the North Santiam waters during the month. May temperatures, he said, were higher ranging from 60 to 80 degrees, but the maximum recorded was 94 degrees and the minimum 35. There were 16 days without precipitation, but the total for the month still was 6.6 inches. Heaviest precipitation was noted on May 6 and 7 when there was 3.04 inches. Westrick recorded May 30 as the peak usage day at Detroit Dam. He reported tent and trailer spaces at Oregon State Park Commission Lakeshore Camp exceedingly popular and Hoover and Southshore Camps filled during weekends. Day visitors to the project made good use of the boat launching area at the Southshore camp. The Blowout Road, access to Hoover and Southshore, has been heavily gravelled and is being used considerably more by recreationists. Westrick said the 28,962 visitors to Detroit in May included some from 21 states and Japan and Canada.

The accident occurred just after midnight, but was not discovered immediately because of light traffic and the position of the car in the ditch, police said.

Disaster Plans for Facing Fire Threat in Blowdown Timber To Be Discussed

SALEM—Disaster plans for combating the forest fire threat caused by the Columbus Day hurricane will be given a public airing at a two-state action conference set for Portland, July 8. Governor Mark O. Hatfield has designated Dwight Phipps, Oregon state forester, and Governor Albert Rosellini has named Bert Cole, Washington land commissioner, to serve as co-chairmen of this two-state alert meeting. More than 100 top forest protection officials representing private, state and federal agencies have been invited by the two governors to attend the meeting which is slated for the Congress Hotel, Portland, and will start with a luncheon. In a joint statement the governors warned: "Tinder dry, red slash resulting from the Columbus Day hurricane covers the forest floor in our two states to depths ranging from two to 20 feet. Never in our history has the threat of forest fire disaster been so great. We urge every citizen of our two states to observe the utmost caution when traveling in these critical forest areas during the hot summer months when the fire threat is greatest." Plans for fighting forest fires starting in this red slash, said the governors, will be presented at this meeting. Forest officials will designate areas of greatest danger, will sketch the public's role in preventing fires, and will develop battle plans so that all agencies can cooperate in case of large fires. Newspapers, radio and television are urged to attend the meeting and to help convey to the public the extreme urgency and need for summer long vigilance, the chief executives said.

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Darrell Farman Loses Sight in One Eye in Accident

Mrs. Guy Sorensen received word this week that her son, Darrell Farman, had received an injury at Olga Bay, Alaska which caused him to lose the sight of his left eye. He was doing some work on his cabin when he hit a nail glancing blow and it flew back and struck him directly in the eye. He was taken to Anchorage Hospital where doctors said the eye itself could be saved if no complications developed, but that the sight was entirely gone. Darrell has been in Alaska for a number of years where he acts as a guide for hunting parties. Doctors said he would have to rest for some time but that they saw no reason why he should not be able to continue with the work later.
