## Voter Registration Information Given By Don Penfold

Don Penfold, Linn county clerk, stated this week when releasing the detailed voters registration figures as of the close of registration September 14, that a voter registration decrease was noted.

Main cause of the decrease was the removal of all incorrect or inactive registrations. Names of persons who have not voted in the last two county-wide elections were removed from the poll list in early spring. Also removed were the names of those deceased or reregistered in some other precinct.

In East Mill City on the Linn county side there was a total of 192 registered voters with 136 of them Democrats and 56 Republicans. Six were Independent.

In West Mill City there were 327 registered with 202 Democrats and 120 Republicans. Five were Independents.

## Former Resident Passes Away At Smith Center, Kan.

Mrs. Don Clark, the former Nita Braden, and Mrs. Verne Clark, the former Maud Braden, have received word of the passing of their brother, Carl R. Braden at Smith Center, Kansas where he resided. Mr. Braden was born to John and Tiny Braden in Smith County, Kan. December 31, 1889 and came with his parents to Oregon in 1901.

The family first lived at McCray's Camp a few miles below Detroit, where the father worked in the woods and the mother cooked at the cook house. Later they moved to Gates to be nearer work for the children. While he was in his teens, Carl started packing freight from Gates to the mines beyond Elkhorn. At that time the wagon road went only as far as Elkhorn so it was necessary to pack the freight in on horses. He used as many as 10 or a dozen horses tied one behind the other to haul the freight over rather dangerous trails. During this time his mother was post master at Gates.

After he returned to Kansas he was engaged in produce buying and selling. After his retirement he and his wife, Mae, spent the winters in Yuma, Ariz. Mr. and Mrs. Don Clark spent the last two winters in Yuma and last winter Mr. and Mrs. Verne Clark spent the Christmas holidays with her brother and sister in Yuma.

Besides the above mentioned wife and sisters, Mr. Braden is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Eleanor Dunston of Gaylord, Kansas; a son, Carl E. Braden, known as Buster Braden of Smith Center, Kansas; a brother Gene E. Braden of Ellinwood, Kansas and four grandchildren.

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## Burns Gives Santiam Reds Bad Time

Santiam fell before the overwhelming size and experience of a tough Burns team Friday night. The Wolverines scrapped and held the Highlanders scoreless for 36 minutes of ball, after a 14 points first quarter, only to allow a score on the final play of the game for the final score of 20-0.

Burns scored their points on a one-yard smash by 267-pound Tim Tyler, a seven-yard sweep by Phil Teal, and a five-yard plunge by Tom Nimsic. They played a powerful game with a multiple offense based on the single wing type of play. Their rushing defense threw Santiam for long losses at critical moments in the game and held the Wolverines scoreless.

Santiam had nothing to be ashamed of in their effort. After a disastrous start, they were able to hold the powerful visitors at bay but a lack of scoring punch kept them from getting back in the ball game. The final score by Burns came at the expense of second stringers who were gaining valuable experience for future encounters and who showed their aversion to being scored upon by throwing the try for point out of the end zone.

The Big Red's hopes were twice kindled by near-breakaway runs by Ron Cannon, the team's leading ground gainer. Defensively, the Wolverines were led by Randy Marshall and Mike Gleason, who were very effective against most of the Highlander sweeps. Rich Walker, Joe Hirte, and Larry Conover, also made outstanding efforts on defense. Captains Don Podrabsky and Larry Drake gave an excellent account of themselves on both offense and defense.

Scheduling of games has given the Wolverines no breathers. Friday they run head-on into Serra which has rebounded from a defeat by Phoenix to beat Central 12-0. Things seem to be going from tough to tougher for the home town lads who have managed to improve with each game. Perhaps they will find the combination of offense and defense necessary for a victory at 8 p. m. Friday.

## New Feeder Line To Make Power More Dependable

Work on a \$24,000 reconstruction of a section of Pacific Power & Light Company's 12,000-volt distribution feeder serving the rural area southeast of Scio is nearing completion, according to Wayne Goin, PP&L's Stayton manager.

Crews are currently replacing 68 poles with 77 new ones to help strengthen the line's resistance to damage caused by wind, lightning and heavy ice and the resulting interruptions of service.

The line, supplied from the Scio substation, extends about five and one-half miles east of Scio and crosses Richardson Gap road.

"When complete, the strengthened installation will help ensure dependable service to PP&L customers between Scio and Mill City," Goin explained.

## Linn-Marion Get Work Project Funds

Willamette National Forest Supervisor, David R. Gibney, today announced plans to spend \$250,000 allocated to the Forest under Phase IV of the Accelerated Public Works Program. The work projects will be in Marion and Linn Counties and will have on-site labor employed by June 30, 1964.

Linn County will receive \$100,000. Use is estimated as follows:

\$8,500 for construction of a road and boat launching ramp at Hoover Campground on Detroit Reservoir in the Detroit Ranger District.

\$19,000 for construction of a water system and comfort station at Hoover Campground.

\$64,000 for construction of a warehouse, residence and other improvements at the site of the new Sweet Home Ranger Station. The Station is now under construction with money allocated under Phase IV of the APWP.

\$8,500 for construction of a comfort station at Trail Bridge Campground along Trail Bridge Reservoir in the McKenzie Ranger District.

The remaining \$140,000 is allocated for use in Marion County. Use is estimated as follows:

\$3,600 for paving road and parking area at Big Springs Campground in the Detroit Ranger District.

\$4,000 for paving at the site of the Mill City Ranger Station.

\$94,400 for reconstruction of the Breitenbush Road. Project will include widening and straightening of a three-mile section of the road beginning about 3/4 miles from the highway.

\$21,000 for an addition to the Detroit Ranger Station.

\$17,000 for construction of Halls Ridge Radio Power Line which will improve Forest Service radio communications in the North Santiam area.

The Willamette is one of 15 National Forests in Oregon and Washington to receive money under Phase IV of the APW program. Previous allocations to the Forest included \$50,000 for construction of a Ranger Station office at Sweet Home and a pre-commercial thinning of young Douglas-fir timber in the Seven Mile Burn along Highway 20.

The Accelerated Public Works Program, signed into law by President Kennedy on September 14, 1962, is designed to help in the initiation and speed up of State, local and Federal public works projects that will help provide immediate useful work for the unemployed and under-employed in labor surplus areas. The Area Re-development Administration of the Department of Commerce is cooperating on National Forest projects.

## Fishermen's Bend Park To Get \$134,000 Grant

Three mid-Willamette Valley public works projects to improve forest facilities will receive \$247,000 under an allotment from the Department of Interior's accelerated works program. It was announced Saturday.

The biggest project in this area will be a \$134,000 grant for the continued development of Fisherman's Bend Park near Mill City east of Salem.

A Yamhill County project received an allocation of \$53,000 and a Linn County works program gets \$60,000.

BLM District Manager Otto C. Krueger said \$99,000 had been earmarked for the Fisherman's Bend Park development, including another shelter and comfort station, bathhouse and main, pipeline. Some \$123,000

has already been obligated for the park which will be dedicated next spring, and the remaining funds will be spent for pre-commercial thinning, snag falling and preparation of forest lands for seeding and planting in the North Santiam area, Krueger said.

It will provide 144 man-months of employment beginning in October.

The Yamhill project will provide 48 man-months of work in various forest improvements and the Linn County job will furnish 60 man-months of employment for hazard reduction, seed collection, road grading and related work.

Word of the projects was received here by Congressman Walter Norblad.
