Those attending are reminded to bring a sack lunch with coffee and jello furnished by the committee.

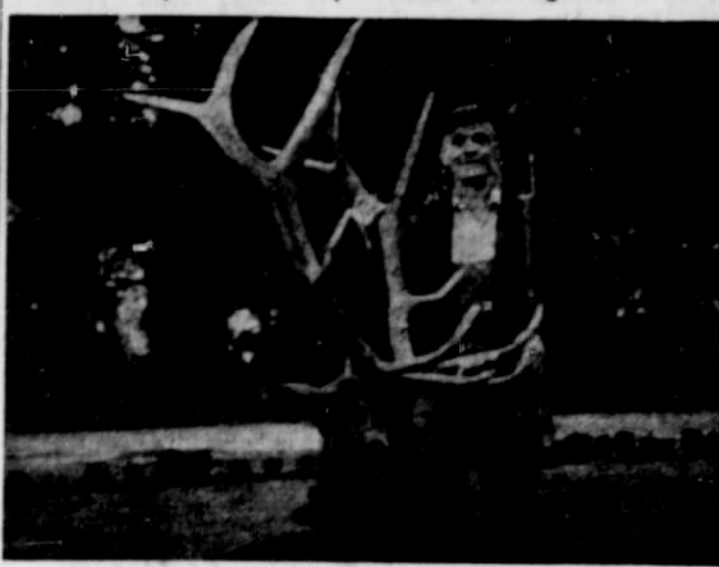

The Santiam Wolverines fell before a fired up Gervais team Friday in the wind and rain of their opponents' field. After fighting to a 20-19 lead early in the fourth quarter, the Wolverines collapsed before the Cougars to the tune of 33-20.

Unable to cope with the reverse play off the single wing, the Wolverines gave up too many scores to recover when their offense disintegrated because of a definite lack of blocking. In the scoring column, Larry Drake powered in for Santiam's first score and tallied on a pass play for the second. Mike Gleason accounted for an extra point. Then Ron Cannon bucked in for the final tally with Larry Drake adding the final extra point.

Scoring for Gervais was too much to enumerate. One back scored four touchdowns—enough to sink the Big Red single-handedly. Enough said.

The disappointment accompanying this loss was felt by all the loyal rooters who braved the elements to watch the Wolverines. The team just did not play up to their potential and this, rather than the loss was the cause for complaint.

Canyon Business Houses Entered

GATES—Three burglaries and one attempted burglary occurred late Sunday night at Gates and Detroit. The door of the Gates General store was pried open and an unknown amount of candy and beer was stolen. About \$13.50 in change and a new wheel bearing were taken from Herron's Union Station.

Entry was gained through a hole broken in the glass door. Hill's Shell Station at Detroit lost \$50 in currency and change after a window was pried open. The door was tampered with at Sophy's Market, also in Detroit, but entry was not made.

State Police Officer Harry J. Yost said the burglaries appeared to be the work of the same persons. The theft of \$1,000 worth of tires from Herron's Station in August may also have been part of their work, but so far there is no conclusive evidence.

Rabies Clinic To Be Held in Lyons Nov. 18

LYONS—A rabies clinic will be held at the Lyons Fire hall on Monday evening, November 18 from 6 until 9 o'clock. Cost of the vaccination is nominal.

The clinic is being held in cooperation with the Linn County Health department.

Rabies, or hydrophobia, is an acute infection which is 100% fatal to man without preventative serum. It is also fatal to all animals except bats. A Lyons boy was recently bitten by a rabid bat and has received the rabies serum.

It is important that your pet be vaccinated against rabies every two years. It is spread to man and animals from saliva of a rabid animal. It may enter the body through a break or a scratch in the skin.
