When spot is gone, put several layers of tissue over the area and weight down with a stack of books for about six hours. Replace with dry tissue and weight down again.

Dark Cotton Dresses for fall launder beautifully if dried only to the damp stage, ready to iron. If you dry them outdoors, turn inside out. Use spray starch on the wrong side of parts that need body. Always shake the can vigorously, then hold at a 45 degree angle, at least 12 inches from the fabric. This gives a fine spray.
