## New Water Filter System in Operation



Four filters for the Mill City water system were put into operation last week by Rex Ohmart, city recorder, and Wayne Goin, Pacific Power & Light Company's local manager. The filters are connected to the water system between the pressure pumps and storage reservoir and are installed to reduce the murky appearance of the city's drinking water during periods of high river flows. Total cost of the new facility was an estimated \$18,000.

## Most Windthrown Timber Now Sold

Approximately 89 percent of the two billion board feet of National Forest timber blown down on Columbus Day 1962 was sold during the year following the storm, reports J. Herbert Stone, Regional Forester, U. S. Forest Service.

In the first 12 months after the destructive storm, 1,225 sales of windthrown timber were made on the National Forests of Oregon and Washington. The sales involved more than 1 1/2 billion board feet of timber. An estimated 450 million board feet remain to be sold.

Nearly 3/4 billion board feet of the accessible blowdown has been logged, and it is estimated that 75 percent of the total salvable blowdown will be harvested by May 30, 1964, if winter weather is not too severe.

The timber salvage program is proceeding at a very satisfactory pace. Stone said, despite difficulties encountered by timber purchasers and the Forest Service. A great volume of the blowdown timber on National Forest land was in rough terrain. This situation, coupled with the uprooted and broken condition of the trees, made sales preparation and logging both difficult and hazardous in many areas.

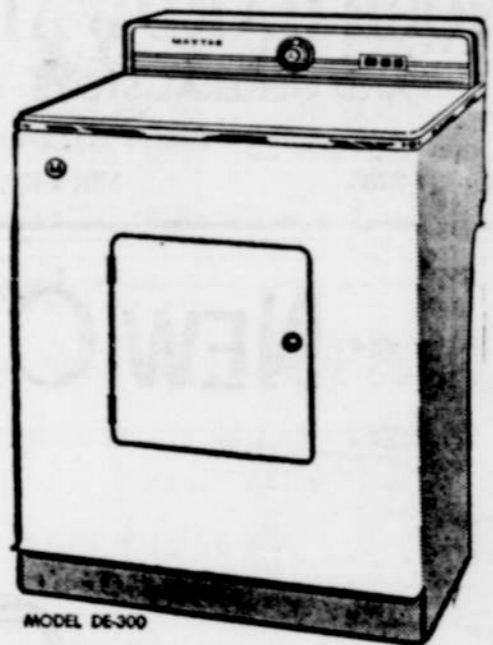
