Lt. Larson Tells of Airlift to Tabago Island Following Storm

GATES—First Lt. Jerry Larson in a letter to his grandmother, Mrs. Walter Brisbin, told of his recent participation in the Military Air Transport Service's humanitarian airlift to the people of Tobago Island. Tobago Island, located north of Venezuela, lost 17 lives and about 90 percent of the dwellings to the onslaught of Hurricane Flora. Lt. Larson piloted a C-124 Globemaster from Charleston AFB in South Carolina to the island delivering a cargo of 385 tents and some cots to be used as temporary housing. He stated the people, mostly colored, except for a few British, were glad to see them and that it made him feel good to be a part of such a mission. A more recent trip took him to Goose Bay, Lab., where another crew took their load of 80 troops on to Germany for Big Light. During his absence, his wife, Sylvia, and two children, had some anxious moments while Hurricane Ginny, which was expected to sweep over Charleston, hovered 50 miles off the coast. Fortunately, it changed course, going on up the coast. Lt. Larson is a native of Gates, and attended both elementary and high school here.
