A committee headed by Cal Culbertson has been drawing plans for a workable system. The town and interested persons have been contacted and hopes are high for a concerted effort to establish a district.

Tentative plans are to submit the proposal to the Lyons water district which has a pump large enough to supply both areas. Another storage tank would need to be installed on the Mehama side for the new district. This must be approved by the


