Three Named To Santiam Memorial Nominating Com.

The Board of Directors of the Santiam Memorial hospital met Thursday night. Committee reports were heard, and the board approved the improvements made at the hospital this past summer. Among main improvements were installation of room thermostats, which adds greatly to the comfort of the patients. Heretofore the hospital heat was controlled only by two thermostats. Administrator Gale Christensen said it was a "little rough when we had a 30 year logger in one room and an 80-year old patient in an adjacent room. One would want it cool, the other warm." This condition has now been taken care of. New oil lines from the storage tanks to the boilers were also put in this summer, which eliminates another source of trouble.

The hospital has completed plans to hook up with the city sewer system which will not entail ripping up the blacktop parking area.

The hospital administrator provided financial sheets for the directors, which shows the hospital is coming along all right in that department, even after allowing for the large amount of free care given to needy people during the year.

Lee Higberger, Noyes Whitten and Paul Geraths were appointed on the nominating committee by President Lloyd Girod. They are to select candidates from Mill City, Stayton and Sublimity and have the names before the executive board the forepart of next month.

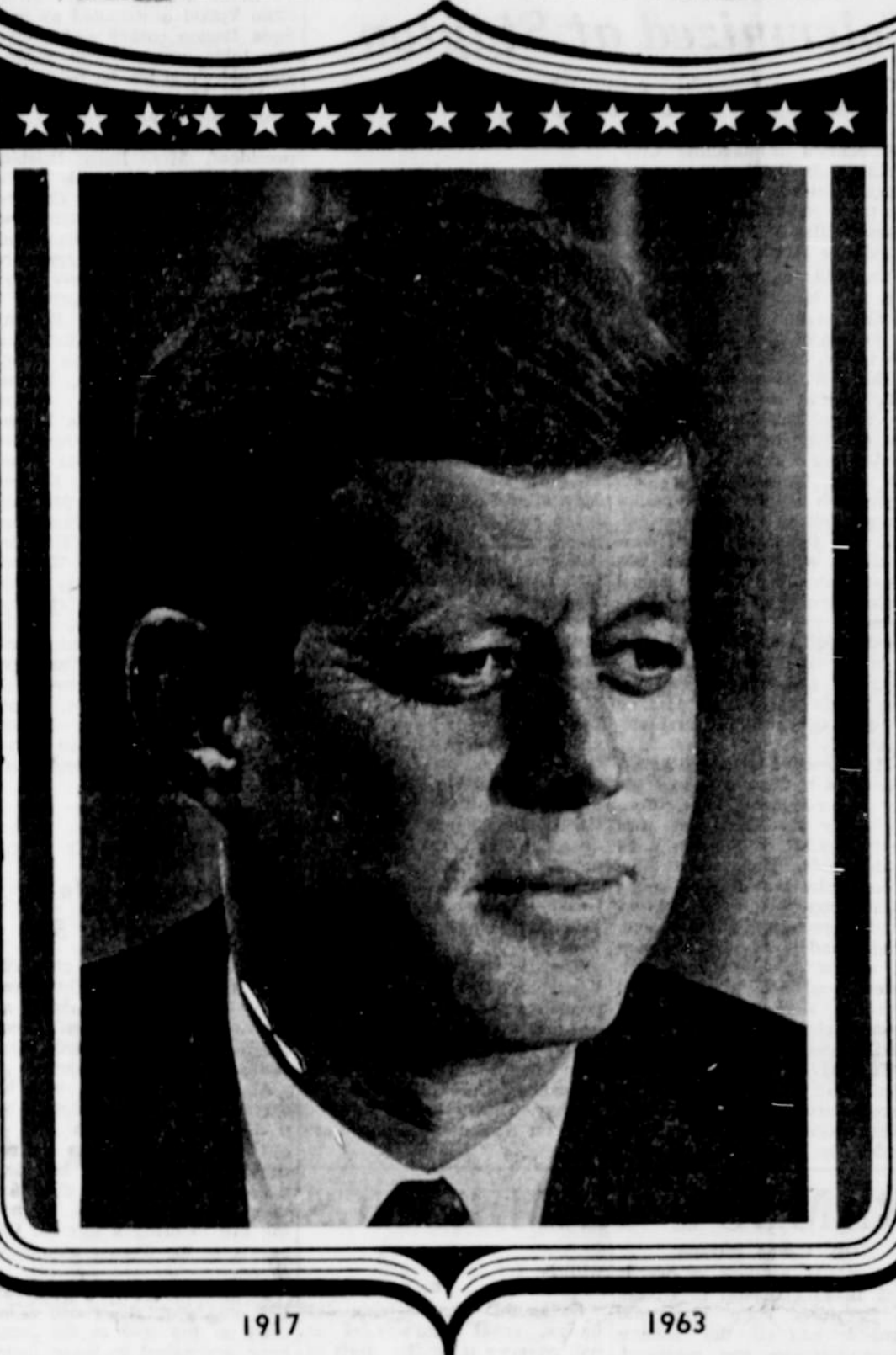
Gates Soldier Now Training in Texas

GATES—Army Pvt. Marvin D. Edwards, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin L. Edwards completed six-weeks of advanced combat training at Fort Hood, Texas, November 16.

During the course, Edwards received instruction in firing individual and crew-served weapons, chemical, biological and radiological (CBR) warfare, map reading, squad tactics and close order drill.

The 18-year-old soldier entered the Army in July 1963 and completed basic training at Fort Ord, Calif.

Edwards is a 1963 graduate of Santiam Union High school at Mill City.

A few short years ago, a new president, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, dedicated himself to the leadership and service of our country. The youngest man in the history of the U. S. was elected president and Monday, all Americans, regardless of political affiliation, irrespective of race or creed, or religious belief bowed their heads in sorrow as this honorable and courageous young man was laid to rest in Arlington National cemetery.

There is little to be said now that has not already been said about this man. Those who saw television tapes of his final speech saw a young man in the prime of his life, doing the job for which we had elected him. He was making speeches of reassurance that our way of life is the right way. His ready wit had endeared him to Americans in all walks of life. Abroad he leaves his mark as a man who has worked untiringly for peace and betterment of people all over the world.

The assassination of President Kennedy on Friday, the killing of a policeman in Dallas, and then the murder of the accused assassin will go down in history as one of the dark times in this modern world.

All government offices were closed Monday in a day of mourning, and here in Mill City, as in most other cities of the country, union memorial services were conducted at 1 p. m. in the Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Thomas B. Scott played organ music and Mrs. Eugene Davenport sang. There was also congregational singing.

The prayers of the ministers and those attending the services joined with those of many nations and faiths throughout the world.

Mill City Fire District To Vote Monday, Dec. 2

An election will be held on Monday, December 2 at the fire hall by the Mill City Rural Fire Protection district when a fire protection Code will be voted on.

A director for a five-year term will also be elected at this time with the name of Otto J. Koenke appearing on the ballot.

Main provision of the code is to require persons owning or in custody of buildings and land to remove fire hazards and cut and remove grass. It is also to prevent the unguarded burning of trash without a permit.

Gates To Hold Elections Monday

GATES—A Gates City election and Gates Rural Fire Protection District election will be held Monday, December 2 from 2 to 8 p. m. at the Gates Fire hall.

City offices being voted on are two three-year terms expiring December 31, 1963, including that of Mayor, now held by Walter Brishin and that of city councilman held by Mrs. Homer Williamson. Mrs. Williamson has been filling out the term vacated by the resignation of Richard Parker.

Officers for Fire District officials being voted on are one five-year term for district director expiring December 31, 1963 now held by Robert Oliver, one office of director expiring December 31, 1965 held by Rex Britton who was appointed to the office following the death of Floyd Volkel, one office of director expiring December 1966 held by Eugene Jacobson, who was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Robert Blumenstein.

Also being voted on is a fire prevention code to regulate burning and reduce fire hazards. Petition blanks are available at the Gates General store for anyone wishing to run for any of these offices. The signatures of 15 regular voters are required.

Judges and clerks for the election are G. C. Barnhardt, L. F. Allen and T. W. Kelle.

Detroit Dam To Be Under "Attack" November 29-30 By OSU Raider Detachment

On the 29th and 30th of November Detroit Dam will be "under attack" by the Oregon State University "Raider Detachment," a special unit of the Reserve Officers Training Corps. The detachments made up of students who devote part of their military training to study of unconventional warfare techniques. The operation, designated "Raider III," is the third field exercise in which the unit has participated.

Raider III will be played under the assumption that the northwestern US and parts of British Columbia have been occupied by an Aggressor Nation. While Allied Canadian and US military forces are supposedly organizing an offensive to oust the Aggressors, the Raider Detachments execute behind enemy lines guerrilla type actions to harass the occupation force. The mission of Raider III is to deprive the Aggressor of the hydroelectric power generated at the dam.

On the 29th of November the dam will be "occupied" by the Aggressor, a unit of specially selected ROTC cadets who wear official Aggressor uniform and have been trained for this role. The Aggressor will set up a typical guard force at the dam and await the Raider attack. On the morning of the 30th the Raider Detachment will strike.

Blanks and demolition simulators will be in use, but there is no cause for alarm. The exercise will be supervised by Regular Army Personnel and a representative of the Portland Engineer District.

While access to certain areas will be restricted during the maneuver, the parking areas will be open and the public may watch. However no time scheduled is available due to the realistic nature of the problem.

The Raider Detachment is part of special, voluntary counter insurgency training made available to cadets who are interested in special assignments when they go on active duty.
