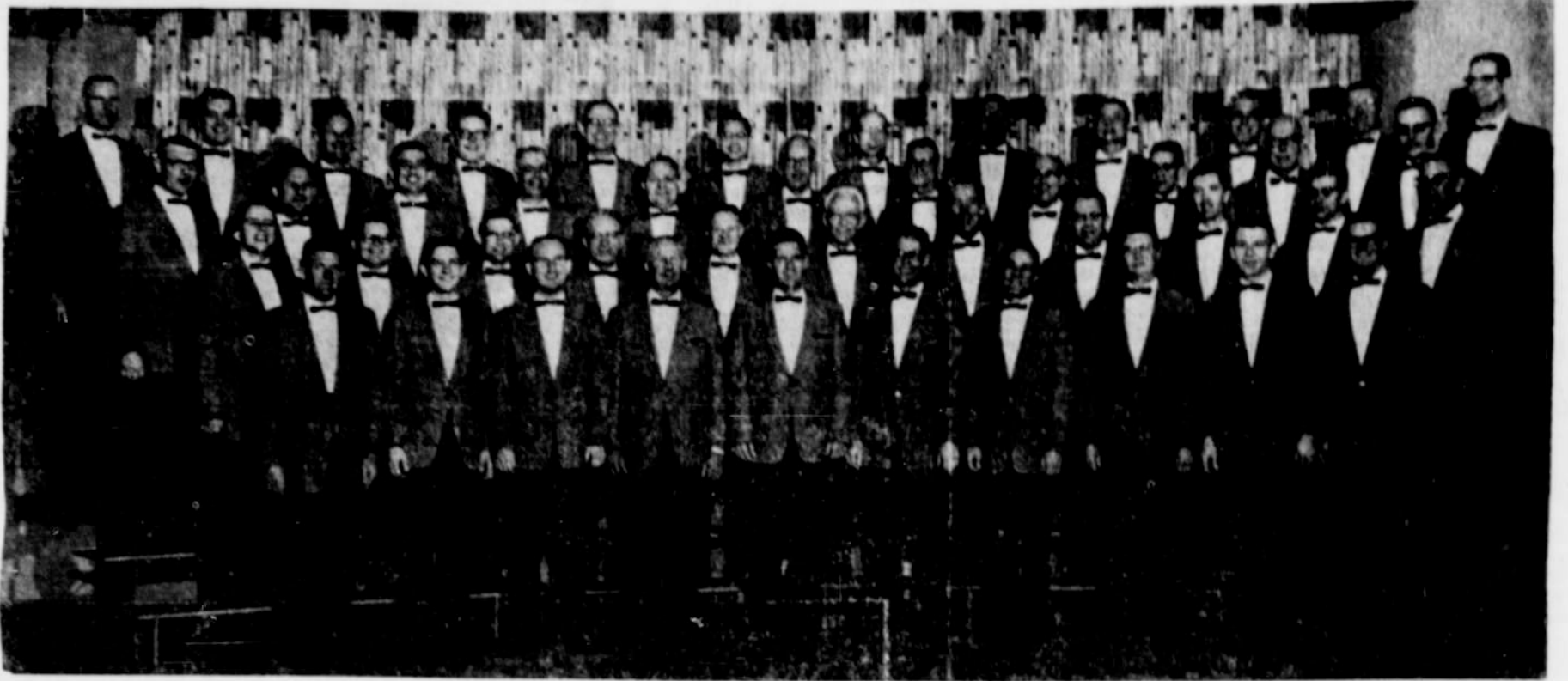

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Monday, our nation paid a final tribute to its fallen leader. As I drove to the special service held at the Lyons Methodist church the reality of this sad day became even more apparent as I saw the flag at half-mast in front of the Mari-Linn school. As I came nearer to Lyons I was surprised and shocked to see smoke billowing from the various mills on this day of National mourning as proclaimed by President Johnson and Governor Hatfield.

Later as I sat at the organ and began the sad and majestic strains of Bach, the shrill sound of a mill whistle brought a terrible discord to the quietness of the music and the meditative thoughts of those present.

Later as the minister echoed the words of our martyred president's inaugural address, "Ask not what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country," another blast from the mill whistle interrupted the service.

Thus the irony and callousness of this was made even more apparent by the management of these mills who would not interrupt their material gains for even one day to pay tribute to their slain president. A man who died perhaps due to a growing indifference on the part of many to the respect due our leaders and to the principals upon which this nation was founded regardless of political philosophy. After witnessing the indignity of this day, one wonders if he did indeed, in part, die in vain.

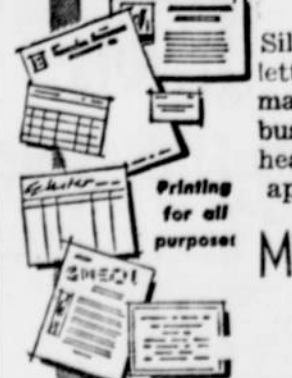
