Removing a large molded salad is easier if you follow these directions: Slightly moisten the salad surface and the plate with cold water before unmolding. Loosen the edges with a spatula or small knife dipped in warm water about 1/2 inch deep all the way round. Quickly dip the mold, almost to the rim, in warm water. For a glass mold use hot water. Shake gently to see whether the salad is loosened. If not, dip again. Dip quickly two or three times to prevent gelatin from melting. Once it is loosened, place a serving plate on top. Then invert the plate and the mold and shake. Lift the mold carefully, and arrange greens around the edge. Small individual salads can be unmolded directly on the greens.

### 1965 Legislature Will Face A Financial Crises

Oregon's special session of the legislature adjourned early last week in what most would say was a successful session.

The fact that Governor Hatfield's budget cutting requests and the Boardman Space Age Industrial Park lease to Boeing Co. received majority support would give reason to believe the legislature accomplished what was expected of it.

There is, however, one very controversial but nevertheless important issue which still remains unsettled, that of the state's financial picture next biennium.

Some citizens—and legislators too—would want us to believe the 1965-67 biennium budget is the responsibility and problem of the 1965 legislature. But is it?

State and legislative leaders will want to keep existing services in line with state needs. Projecting automatic and essential increases such as basic school support and higher education, the legislative fiscal office estimates the state will need \$41 million in new revenue next biennium.

Its projection does not include any new services nor restoration of cuts which came about after the October 15 special election.

In order to offset a \$41 million deficit, the new legislature, like the present, will have the choice of reforming Oregon's tax structure, enacting new revenue raising measures or spending less and then operating under existing income.

Either one or a combination of these moves would be necessary, since the state's existing narrow-based tax structure cannot withstand an additional burden.

The latter choice for all practical purposes would not solve future fiscal problems, although it could be used as a partial offset. Tax reform in Oregon has been attempted several times in the past with little success. Under similar legislative control, reform would seem doubtful.

This leaves the unpopular remaining choice—new taxes. And the most likely would be a general sales and use tax. Without knowing the temperament of the people toward a sales tax, or any other tax for that mat-

ter, the 1965 legislature may be faced with the prospects of another referral and a special session.

Some responsible state and local organizations are one step ahead of the next legislature. The Citizens Committee for Income and Property Tax Relief, some Chambers of Commerce and other groups are presently investigating the possibility of initiating a sales tax.

Although the majority of these groups will not campaign for a Yes vote, they do wish to place a good and equitable sales tax on the November ballot in order to give the legislature some guideline as to the will of the people.

Should the electorate pass a sales tax, all financial problems would not be solved, but the legislature would know new revenue is available. If, on the other hand, a sales tax is defeated, law makers would know to look elsewhere for funds.

The House, in preparation for the next biennium, made an attempt to refer a four-cent per pack cigarette tax to the people, but the Senate majority which had earlier voted not to pass any new taxes, tabled the House passed bill.

The 1963 legislature has completed its major function this biennium. But for those who will return in 1965 and those who will be new, that one problem most unwanted—financial crises—will prevail.
