### Street Litter Talk at City Council Meet

Ballots for the recent city election were canvassed at the December 11 meeting of the city council with confirmation of Stanley Chance and Veryl Hoover, re-elected to three year terms as councilmen and J. C. Kimmel to again serve as mayor.

The problem of litter on the streets was brought to the attention of the council by school officials with the result that more garbage cans will be placed around town.

Council members approved the placing of a street light at Highway 22 and N. W. 9th street.

Members also gave authority to Administrative School District 129J to close S. W. Evergreen street between 2nd and 4th streets to through traffic between the hours of 8 a. m. and 4 p. m.

Police report for the month of November was submitted by Ron Meacham, police chief.

It was noted that the new radar system had slowed city and highway "speedsters" considerably.

There were 18 radar speed warnings issued; one arrest for being A.W.O.L.; one arrest for burglary not in a dwelling; nine complaints were reported with five of them cleared. Fines were collected for the month amounting to \$29.00.

The police car patrolled 1,518 miles using 173.2 gallons of gas.

Schaer is enrolled in the air force reserve officer training program at Oregon State. He is a junior in the School of Education.

Thirty-one top ROTC students from the army, navy, air force and marine corps units were picked for the honorary this fall on the basis of scholarship and leadership. OSU is one of only 35 colleges in the country that offers ROTC training in all branches of service.

### Car Does Flip But Still Makes Trip

X-rays were taken Monday. The car body was damaged and one tire blown out.

### 6,800 Visit Detroit Dam Last Month

An estimated 6,800 visitors in 2,719 vehicles visited the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers' Detroit Dam, according to Donald A. Westrick, project engineer.

The total, he said, includes people from 16 states, Canada, Germany and Australia. During the first 11 months of the calendar year some 413,302 people have been counted at the 17 viewpoint and recreation locations within the Detroit reservoir area. They came in 126,814 vehicles.

The November visitor total raises to 2,523,358 the grand total for the past 10 years and 11 months, according to Westrick.

During the five clear days, four with only a trace of rain and 21 with rain, 38 boaters were observed at the project and 6,762 sightseers. Temperatures during the 30 days ranged from 64 to 33 degrees. Precipitation totaled 16.14 inches.
