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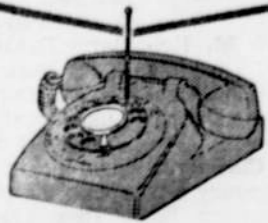

Birthday Party For Jesse Haywood

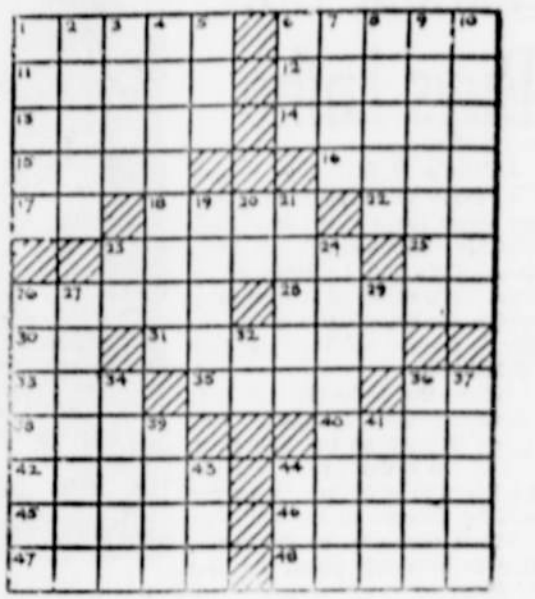

Chris Sorensen Talks To PTA Members

Christian Sorensen made his first speech at a public meeting last Wednesday evening at Santiam PTA.

Before the talk Mrs. Dave Barnhardt conducted a short business meeting when it was announced the next meeting would feature Founders Day. Chris, as he is known to his schoolmates and others, was introduced by Mrs. Hazel Leaming, program chairman.

Chris said compulsory education exists in his native Denmark with the ages 7-14 and schools are not all co-educational except through the first five grades.

Students attend different schools according to their ability with one group attending school through grade nine and then going on to some sort of vocational school and the others go through grade 10 when they may continue for the next two years and then attend universities there as in the United States but teachers, engineers and such attend specialized schools where they learn only their profession.

He said he found there was a great deal more homework here than in Denmark schools. Chris said he started learning foreign languages in the sixth grade in Denmark. His present plans call for attending engineer school when he returns to his own country.

Chris said they did not have competitive sports in the Denmark schools and band and chorus were also practiced after school. Soccer is a favorite sport in Denmark. Teen-agers there, like those in this country list dancing as a favorite pastime.

Students in Denmark attend schools free, even the universities; however they have taxes just the same as we do. Prices there are lower than here but wages are also lower. Chris said he thought the things that impressed him most about this country was its vastness and the big cars. In Denmark there are fewer and smaller cars.

He showed beautiful colored slides of his country and also answered many questions following his talk.
