Dorman Gregory Is Now in Alaska

FORT RICHARDSON, ALASKA—Army Pfc Dorman R. Gregory, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Gregory of Mill City is participating in Exercise POLAR SIEGE, a 12-day field training exercise in Alaska which was scheduled to end on Monday, February 10.

More than 10,000 U. S. and Canadian military personnel took part in the exercise, the largest ever held in Alaska. POLAR SIEGE took place over 2,400 square miles of wilderness and is the first cold weather test of the Army's new infantry brigades organized last year under the Army-wide reorganization of combat units.

The 21-year-old soldier, a mechanic in Headquarters Company, 4th Battalion of the 171st Infantry Brigade's 9th Infantry at Fort Wainwright, Alaska, entered the Army in January 1962 and completed basic training at Fort Lewis, Wn.

Gregory was graduated from Santiam High school in 1960 and attended Pacific University at Forest Grove.
