WILDLIFE WEEK—A WORTHY EFFORT

This newspaper takes pride in supporting National Wildlife week—March 15-21. We also commend the National Wildlife Federation and its state affiliates for promoting this public service.

The 1964 theme is: "America Needs Outdoor Recreation—Act Now to Provide for the Future."

With expanding populations, more leisure time, and ease of modern travel, it is imperative that every community and state develop plans now to provide areas where people can enjoy the out-of-doors.

National Wildlife Week in the past has alerted the public to important conservation problems: the need to preserve endangered species of valuable wildlife, the importance of conserving wetlands for waterfowl, the desirability of fully developing wildlife and outdoor

recreation potentials in public land management policies, and the abatement of water pollution in our river basins and waterways.

The Outdoor Recreation Resources Review Commission was established by Congress in 1958. Congress directed the Commission to survey the outdoor recreation needs of the American people for the next 40 years and recommend action to meet these needs.

When the ORRRC report was issued in January, 1962, the following statement was made:—"All in all, being in the outdoors is a good, wholesome, healthful use of leisure time. The fact that we live in a world that moves crisis by crisis does not make a growing interest in outdoor activities frivolous, or ample provision for them unworthy of the nation's concern."

We urge all citizens to become informed on outdoor recreation, needs and act now to provide for the future.

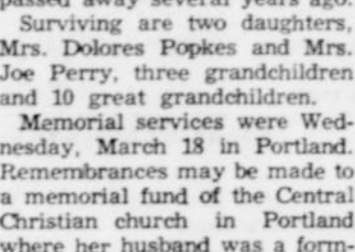

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Many Linn County Residents Still Have Not Filed Returns

Some 700 of Linn County's Personal Property taxpayers have overlooked or forgotten to file their returns for the year 1963.

This means the Assessor's office must take certain steps including assessment of a penalty for late-filed returns. Although we are required to do this, it is not something we like to do because it is far more costly to process a late-filed return than one which arrives on schedule.

"This reminder might be considered in the taxpayer's interests also" said Al Brown, Linn County Assessor, "in that it is unnecessary to pay the penalty if filing is made within the time limits allowed.
