Up and Down The Avenue

Every once in awhile I have an opportunity to go up into the woods and watch the loggers and their equipment at work. This is always a treat for me. Hank Heibert of H & W Logging company was my host Friday morning. We left here about 9:30 and went up Kinney Creek, above Detroit Dam where they had their outfit working. The day was perfect, warm and bright sun. Making a trip like this gives one an opportunity of seeing some of the other fellow's problems, and loggers have them believe me. Hank showed me large areas of road which had been buried in earth slides. At one point Hank said a huge rock bigger than his pickup went crashing down the mountainside and into the lake, but not before it had smashed out a section of the road. It took a D8 cat considerable time to clear the road.

With modern day equipment he showed me how they were now logging areas which would have been next to impossible with old time methods. It is interesting to see the fallers at work and see the big trees being cut, however one is always some what saddened when he thinks of how many years it took for the tree to grow, and how little time it takes to drop it.

There is considerable snow in those parts too, which can be seen in the picture on page one. The snow is packed hard, and in some places is over 10 feet deep.

Anyone who thinks those men don't earn their pay, should make a trip up into the woods and watch them work for awhile. I think they would change their tune.

The Administration's war on poverty should not blind us to the need for another assault—an all-out war on federal waste.
