Everything fell out of the cupboards and breakable things broke in a million pieces.
"We have had so many tremors since. Douglas stays right by me. I know he is afraid. He doesn't cry but just grabs hold

of me. They flew bread into Anchorage from Fairbanks and it was 66¢ a loaf. Anchorage bakeries are now operating. We have lights and water since Saturday noon, but must be a little conservative on all. Water must be boiled.
"We feel thankful that we are all okay and have our home. I think it rocked just as hard here but the ground didn't break. Ken helped to put things back together at Cole's laundry Monday afternoon and Tuesday he delivered laundry and dry cleaning but did not pick up things to be done."

Mrs. Raymond Branch and Mrs. Lilly Wolfkiel were hostesses for the pot luck luncheon.

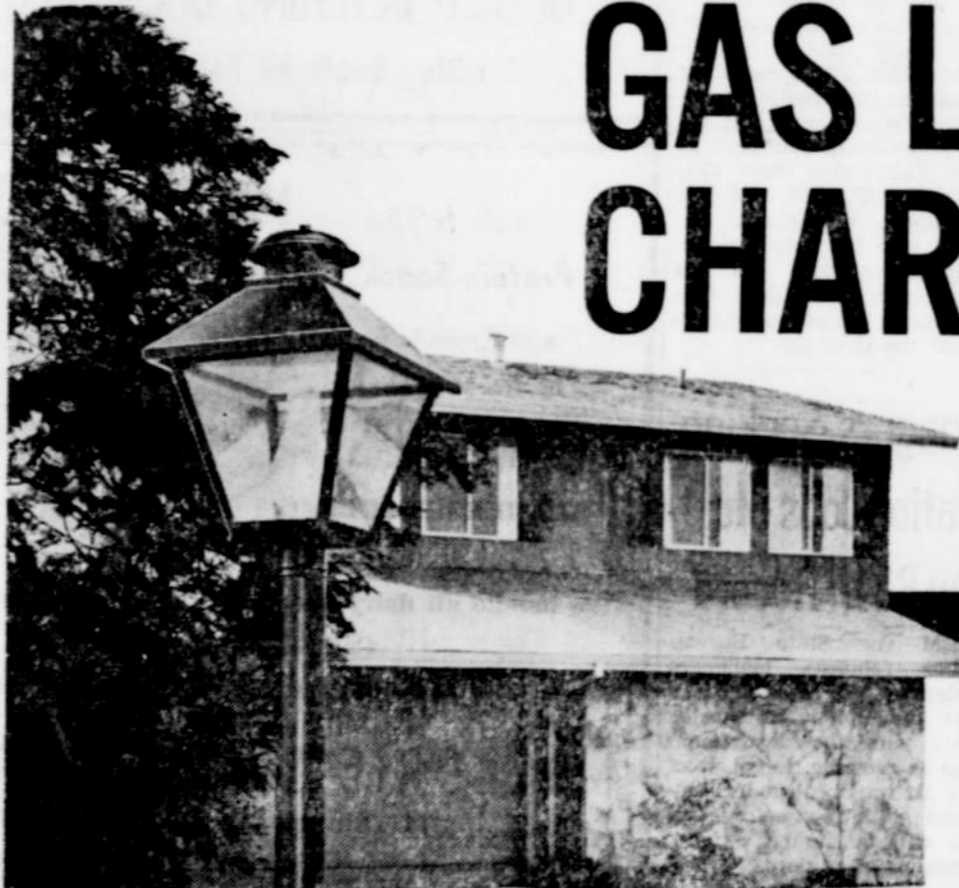
