Your Social Security

Q. I am a social security beneficiary and am planning to take a vacation for two or three months. During this time, I will be traveling a great deal, but somebody will be at home to receive my mail. Do I have to do anything about changing my address?

A. As long as somebody is at home to receive the mail and will hold the check in a safe place for you, there's nothing else need do.

Q. If a beneficiary changes his address with the post office, is it still necessary for him to change his address with the Social Security Administration?

A. Yes, by all means. He should make the necessary change with the P. O., but he should also change his address with the Social Security Administration. In this way, he will avoid delay in receiving his checks.

Q. I am selling my house and I am going to travel around the country for the next few months. What do I do about my social security checks?

A. Get in touch with your nearest social security office and they will help you work out satisfactory arrangements. Perhaps the checks can be sent in care of a relative until you establish a more permanent address.

Q. How soon should I let social security know about a change of address?

A. As soon as possible. Try to notify the Social Security Administration no later than the 15th of the month before you move. This will make it possible for you to receive your regular monthly check without delay.

Q. Can you send my social security check to me while I am in foreign country?

A. In most cases, yes. However there are certain restrictions that apply when you receive benefits outside the United States. Get in touch with your local social security office for details. They can also give you a special post card on which to report your new address.

Work Smarter . . Not Harder

STRETCH FABRICS are certain to be part of back to school sewing chores this month. New to many people, these are likely to be a disappointment and a waste of money unless handled properly. Knowing a few short cuts can make the difference between success and failure, says Elaine Carlson, Extension clothing specialist at OSU.

Be careful not to distort the fabric when you pin on the pattern or while cutting. The seams of these garments have to "give." Use a textured nylon thread or a small zig-zag stitch.

Miss Carlson also warns against hanging garments which have vertical stretch. Fold them flat for storage.

INSTANT SOAP PADS, made the do-it-yourself way, are handy for picnics, hikes and travel. Soak folded paper towels in a dense soap solution. Then dry the soaped-up towels over an outdoor line. Keep them on hand in the car or tuck one in your pocket. They need only to be dunked in water to serve as a pre-soaped washcloth.

WHAT CAUSES JELLY TO WEEP? What's wrong when it's cloudy? Virginia Weiser, OSU nutrition specialist with Extension Service, offers these possible causes for "weeping." There may be too much acid, the paraffin layer may be too thick, or you may have stored the jelly in too warm a place.

Cloudy jelly may be due to pouring the mixture too slowly, letting it stand too long before pouring, improper straining of juice, or fruit that was too green.

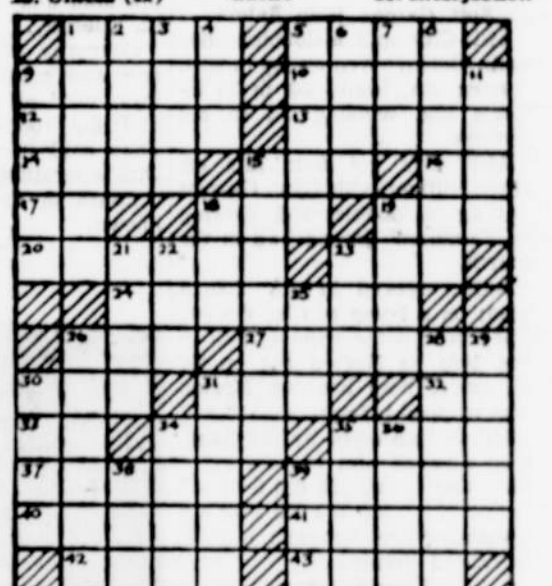
