Plans Underway to Clear Debris From Reservoirs

The Forest Service and Corps of Engineers are cooperating in plans to carry out the huge task of clearing the mass of debris deposited in four large reservoirs by the Christmas flood.

The agencies said the Forest Service has agreed to accept primary responsibility for the massive cleanup operation in Hills Creek, Cougar, Detroit, and Lookout Point reservoirs in the Willamette National Forest. The Forest Service also will be responsible for supervising replacement of project roads damaged by the flood.

He also spoke about the new power lines that were being installed in the canyon area and the new power plant that was being built. These should eliminate or vastly reduce the number of power outages this year.

Mud Takes 50-Ton Yarder For Ride

MEHAMA—The 50-ton logging yarder reported lost last week up Blowout Road has been found. Buried in silt and snow only the wheels are visible, as it is upside down.

Pictures show the swath the yarder cut down through a stand of trees three and four feet in diameter, pushed by the force of water and mud. It would have been impossible to pull the yarder down through those trees.

An arduous six-mile ride on a cat took Perry Clippell to the former landing to search for the missing machinery. Only a cat could travel over the road which is part river, debris and mud.

No one knows how soon the extent of damage to the machine can be estimated as it is buried and packed tight. Two feet of snow is still on the ground.

Idanha Without Phones When Lines Downed by Crane

Trouble related to the recent flood caused the loss of telephone service in Idanha last Thursday night.

A crane used for cleanup work on flood damage along the highway above Detroit caught a guy wire and pulled five telephone poles onto the road.

A telephone company repair crew had the road cleared by 9 P. M. but service was not restored to all subscribers until Friday afternoon.

Cars and trucks ran over the downed telephone cables and damaged them extensively. The repair crew reported that many cars made repeated trips past, apparently sightseeing after they heard of the accident. This unnecessary traffic made repair work more difficult and added to the damage to the cables. Further damage to one cable was caused by an emergency flare placed to warn motorists. While the cable was being moved off the road it pulled into the flare, melting the plastic insulation and shortening some pairs together.

Two crews tackled the repair work and restored service Friday but final repairs were not made until this week.
