Finishes Basic Training

Question: What is the Neighborhood Youth Corps and where can I find out more about it?

Answer: The Neighborhood Youth Corps is established as a work-training program under Title 1-B of the Economic Opportunity Act, and is a part of the U. S. Department of Labor's Manpower Administration. The NYC will make it possible for Youth 16 through 21 to stay in school, return to school if they have already left the classroom, obtain work experience and develop work skills if they are out of school and out of work. Young men and women employed in the Neighborhood Youth Corps will be assigned useful tasks which otherwise would not be performed in government agencies and nonprofit organizations. Their work will result in better services and improved facilities for the public benefit. More information about NYC may be obtained by contacting any Public Employment Service office or the Neighborhood Youth Corps, U. S. Dept. of Labor, Washington, D. C. 20210.

**Natural Gas Curtailed During Recent Cold Snap**

A curtailment of natural gas to "interruptible" customers of Northwest Natural Gas Company was effected during the recent cold weather due to heavy heating demands of the more than 100,000 residential heating customers.

Gas company officials explain that certain industrial customers contract to purchase heavy volumes of the fuel at extremely attractive prices. Within the industry this supply of gas is known as "interruptible" gas. This term derives from the customers' purchase contract for natural gas which they obtain at most favorable prices for two reasons:

1. As large industries they contract for usually large volumes of natural gas, and,
  2. They must constantly maintain standby equipment for utilization of another form of energy in the event of curtailment, when their supply of natural gas will be interrupted due to unusually high heating requirements of residential and other customers.
- Prior to the recent cold weather there and been no general curtailment of natural gas to any of the interruptible customers.

The amount of investment in facilities to bring natural gas from the prime sources in Canada and New Mexico to the Pacific Northwest would have been prohibitive when the big pipelines were first constructed without the heavy volumes used in interruptible customers.

The recoverable supply of natural gas continues to show a greater annual increase than the annual demands for natural gas throughout the nation, so any reference to curtailment should not suggest shortage of supply.

**SOUP 'N CRACKERS HIT THE SPOT**



There's nothing that hits the spot on a cold night like a bowl of warming soup. It certainly chases the chills away. As the folks come in one by one... the children from school and Dad from the office... have the first course for dinner ready and waiting for all to help themselves.

Set up a soup bar. As for the soup tureen, the sky's the limit... a bean pot, casserole, or electric saucepan. Fill it with a tasty combination of canned condensed bean with bacon and beef noodle soups. It's mighty satisfying. Arrange soup bowls or sturdy mugs, spoons, and napkins on a tray close by.

The cracker treats to go along can be plain or fancy. The children will enjoy a selection of their favorite crackers "as is" while Dad might prefer some topped with cheese and herbs, bubbling from the oven.

**Bean and Noodle Bowl**

- 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
- Cook green pepper in butter until tender. Blend in soups and water. Heat; stir now and then. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

**Cracker Treats**

- Sliced American cheese, cut in squares
- Whole Wheat wafers (Triscuits)
- Caraway, celery, or sesame seeds
- Paprika

Place square of cheese on each whole wheat wafer; sprinkle with seeds and paprika. Place on cookie sheet; heat in 450° oven about 5 minutes or until cheese is bubbly. Serve immediately.
