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



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Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

With Electric Baseboard Heat should draperies come to the floor? No, say the engineers. For economical heating plus safety, draperies should be about six inches above the heating unit. Top of the draperies should be at least an inch below the ceiling. The reason is this. If draperies come down over the baseboard unit, heat gets trapped between the fabric and the window rather than flowing out into room. There's more much of the heat escapes to the outdoors.

A Working Wife With a 3-Year-Old Boy and a student husband doesn't worry about what to do in her spare time. Such a homemaker is Mrs. C, an office worker.

Mr. and Mrs. C start to work 20 minutes early in order to leave young Terry with the baby sitter. Living in a 45-foot house trailer cuts down on kitchen mileage. Their 3-year old has been trained to pick up and put away his toys. "This saves a lot of work," says Mrs. C.

Who Isn't Interested in More Family Income and Prosperity? You might not have thought about it this way but increased international trade can do this for U. S. and Oregon families. So says Dr. Marguerite Buske, University of Minnesota economist, who spoke on the Oregon State University campus recently.

Foreign trade isn't just something for the officials in Washington to worry about. Homemakers are involved too. Mrs. Alberta Johnston, OSU's Extension family finance specialist, points that if Oregon sells more wheat, pears, lumber and other products abroad, farmers sell their products, mills can hire more workers who can buy more food and clothing, and so on. The benefits continue to multiply. It's a never ending cycle.

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
