Oregon Gets \$6,125,110 Federal Funds for Education

Whether you like it or not, Federal Aid to Education is here, and it must be accepted. This week The Enterprise tells something of the money to be received state wide, and next week, the local angle will be covered.

Most of Oregon's 409 school districts are eligible for federal funds for the education of disadvantaged children under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. The State Department of Education has announced the maximum basic grants to which 391 districts in 31 counties are entitled for the 1965-66 school year.

These 381 districts serve areas with large numbers of children from low income families according to Department of Education estimates. By federal definition, a district is eligible for a basic grant only if it serves at least 100 children, aged five to seventeen, from families earning less than \$2,000 annually or serves disadvantaged children equal in number to at least 3 percent of the total school-age children in the district, whichever is less. The number is economically deprived children served cannot be less than 10.

Districts meeting the above formula for federal aid will be submitting applications to the State Department of Education for programs to utilize the federal funds.

Eligibility of Oregon districts was based on the 1960 census count of children in the state from families earning less than \$2,000 and on Public Welfare statistics on the number of children in the state from families receiving \$2,000 or more from welfare in 1962. These figures together indicate that there are 29,937 disadvantaged children between the ages of 5 and 17 in Oregon. This figure multiplied by \$272.80, one-half the average cost of educating a child in Oregon in 1964-65, yielded the amount authorized.
